

Income Tax Information.

Forms 1040A, revised and simplified, for filing individual ceturn of income for the calendar year of 1021 of \$5000 and less were available Wednesday, January 18th, at the office of Collector of Internal Revenue, 2. L. Sturgess, and branch office at Trenton, N. J. A copy will b mailed to taxpayers who last year filed a return, but failure to receive a form does not relieve the taxpayer of his obligation to file a return on before March 15th; 1922. The form has been reduced from viz to four pages, two of which are devoted to instructions which should i arefully read by the taxpayer before filling in the blanks. A study these instructions will greatly lessen difficulties beretofore excounters

n correctly making out the returns. On page 1, under the head of "Income," are spaces for reporting he following items: salaries, wages, commissions, etc., income from partnerships, fiduciaries, etc., rents, and royalties; profit (or loss) from business of profession; profit (or loss) from sale of real estate; profit (or Are you in need of the Services of loss) from sale of stocks, bonds etc., and other income. Beneath are paces for entering deductions : such as interest and taxes paid during the year; losses by fire, storm, shipwreck, or other casualty; or by theft

On page 2 are spaces for entering explanations of the various items e., the total amount of income from business or profession with description ("grocery," "retail clothing," "drug store," "laundry," "doctor," "lawyer," "farmer") from rents, and royalties, sale or prop-

Returns are required of every single person and every married person not living with husband or wife, whose income for 1921 was \$1000 or more, and of every matried person living with husband or wife whose net income was \$2000 or more. If the net income of husband, wife and dependant minor children equaled or exceeded \$2000, or if the combined gross income of husband, wife and dependant minor children equalled or exceeded \$5000, all such income must be reported on a joint return, or in seperate returns for husband and wife. If single, and the net is come, including that of dependent minors, if any, equalled or exceeded \$1000, or if the gross income equalled or exceeded \$5000, a return must be filed. A minor, however, having a net income of \$1000 or \$2000, according to marital status, or a gross income of \$5000, must file a return. The requirement to file a return of gross income, regardless of the amount of net income, upon which the tax is assessed, is a new provision "Net income" is gross income less certain deductions which are

Under each of the above conditions, a report must be filed even though no tax is due. The exemptions are \$1000 for single persons and married persons not living with husband or wife, \$2500 for married ersons living with husband or wife whose net income for 1921 was \$5000 or less, and \$2000 for such persons whose net income was more than \$5000. The exemptions for dependants "a person under eighteen rears of age or mentally or physically defective," has been increased

A head of a family, a person who actually supports in one house hold one or more persons clonely related to him (or her) by blood, marriage or adoption, is granted the same exemptions allowed a married

The normal tax rates are unchanged, 4 per cent on the first \$4000 of net income above the exemption and 8 per cent on the remaining net income. The tax this year, as last, may be paid in full at the time of filing the return, or in four equal installments, due on or before March 15, June 15, September 15, and December 15.

Heavy penalties are provided by the new revenue act for failure to file a return and pay the tax on time.






