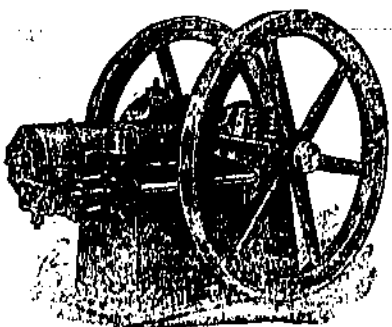

## The Highest Style of Woman.

To the Girls:

To the letters I wrote you a while  
ago, I add another, hoping that it may  
be helpful at such a time as this.

The question of greatest import to  
you now is, Ought I to be a Christian?  
Some of you have already decided this  
and find the deepest and purest joy  
you ever knew, while others are con-  
sidering it, and because unable to see  
that it means the development of your  
higher and nobler self, have not yet  
decided.

The highest possible attainment to  
which our humanity can hope to  
arrive is to become acquainted with,  
to know God, and to love and serve  
him.

One of you said, "There is so much  
to be given up to become a Christian."  
Ah, no! this is a sad mistake; there  
is nothing to give up but sin, while  
there is a beautiful Christian woman-  
hood to win. There is nothing to  
give up but the things which oppose  
our growth in spiritual beauty and  
power. There is nothing to give up  
but the lesser, and take the higher  
and better things. He who created  
the heavens and the earth and all  
things in them, asks us not to set our  
hearts upon things temporal, and on  
evil, but to choose the better, the  
eternal gifts he has prepared for who-  
soever will take.

When Mary of old sat at the feet of  
Jesus and learned of him, he said she  
had chosen the better part. It was  
the better part, whether considered  
subjectively or objectively. Mary  
opened the sublimest avenues of her  
being and accepted her Lord's teach-

ing. It was the better part of her life  
and the best of her Lord's good gifts.

There is nothing that is good and  
true and lovely to be given up. It is  
to bring all the being under symmet-  
rical and beautiful control of the  
spiritual. It is to keep the soul full of  
power and holy activities, and realize  
as the result a life of transcendent  
joy. Such is the Christian's privilege,  
and it is a fount of perpetual happi-  
ness, strength and peace. It includes  
everything that is lovely and of good  
report—gentleness, kindness, courage,  
patience, joy,—all have place in a re-  
ligious life. The material world itself

will reveal more beauty and pleasure  
when enjoyed in the light of this new  
awakening. With the love of an  
obedient child for your Maker, you  
will discover new interests and new  
purposes. All of earth's enjoyments  
will be hallowed, and all earth's dis-  
appointments and sorrows sanctified.

To understand the call of duty and  
then faithfully follow that, it may be  
to meet opposition, misunderstanding,  
or ridicule, is certainly to develop the  
strongest and best qualities of charac-  
ter. Duty demands that we deal  
justly with ourselves, and secure the  
highest good for ourselves as well as  
for others. Our highest nature cannot  
be satisfied with less. This question,  
Am I a Christian? bears the touch-  
stone of duty, and involves the true  
end of life. The poet has well said,  
"We may make our lives sublime,"  
but we can do so only by being true to  
our highest convictions of duty.

This is the life of which the soul-  
loving Whittier wrote when he said:  
"Every mother's daughter of you can  
be beautiful." When this spirit dwells  
within, the face grows radiant and  
lovely, because "the beauty of holiness,  
of purity, of that inward grace  
which passeth show rests over it, soft-  
ening and mellowing its features just  
as the calm moonlight melts those of  
a rough landscape into harmonious  
loveliness." It was of this spiritual  
beauty and purity that John Wool-

man wrote when he said, "Some  
glances of real beauty may be seen in  
their faces who dwell in true meek-  
ness." It is this life and light in the  
soul which shall yield you unalloyed  
and imperishable happiness, both now  
and hereafter. It is this spirituality  
that shall lift you up and exalt you  
among your companions. I have  
seen women grow strong and beautiful  
in life by the unfolding and crystalliza-  
tion of Christian character.

Mr. Moody grew to manhood illit-  
erate, and when he began Christian  
work it was with difficulty he could  
read a chapter in the Bible; but later  
he drew large numbers of distinguish-  
ed men and ministers as hearers. At  
this time I was asked, "What is the  
source of his power?" The only reply  
is that he yielded to God's claim upon  
him; he opened his heart to the  
ministry of the Holy Spirit, and re-  
ceived from God, just as did Paul, and  
just as you and I may do. The same  
Spirit is able to accomplish the same  
marvellous change in other hearts, if  
asked.

We can grow lovely in life and  
heart only by the indwelling of this  
Spirit. Shall we not ask for it? Shall  
we not be quick to ask when we un-  
derstand this wonderful truth?

"Why did you not tell us sooner  
about this religion?" said a converted  
heathen to a missionary. And so will  
you ask when God's message reaches  
your heart.

Shall I tell you why you are not  
already a Christian? It is because  
you have lacked knowledge of the im-  
portance and the nature of the truth.  
Would you choose to be a woman pat-  
terned after this pattern of holy joy,

generous sympathies toward human-  
ity and devotion to your Maker? All  
that is true, noble, and of enduring  
value is found in Christ. The supreme  
aim of life is the attainment of this  
wisdom, and she who finds it finds  
that it transforms and elevates the life  
and develops what is best in the hu-  
man life.

"Righteousness exalteth a nation."  
It also exalteth and blesses the indi-  
vidual. May you no longer hesitate  
to accept this unspendable gift—this  
"better part."
