## Hon. H. C. Kelsey Vindicated.

The Special Joint Committee, appointed to investigate the charges made against certain State officials, have in their report presented points which we have repeatedly made when commenting on the outrageous abuse of the press, in statements made against men in or out of office. The investigation was called on account of the charges made against Hon. H. C. Kelsey, Secretary of State, in his capacity of Commissioner of Insurance for New Jersey; that he had exacted from \$3,000 to \$5,000 from each insurance company under the pretense of charges for examination. After a long and searching investigation, they entirely vindicated the purity and official integrity of the honorable gentleman, and declare that he has by his official acts proved himself a faithful and efficient public officer.

When it is remembered that a faithful and efficient officer may be called for days, and even weeks, from his public duties, and required to spend his time in collecting testimony to prove the integrity of which he has been daily vain to demonstrate by his official acts; that a charge of official corruption is in its very nature so easy to make, and even, when unfounded, often so difficult to refute; and that investigations of this character impede the legislative business and involve the State in heavy expense, it surely becomes the Legislature to exercise its undoubted right of investigation with the utmost care, and to demand that charges made against public officials be specific in their form, and shall have, at least, a reputable author and some show of truth.

Concerning that portion of the resolution directing the "Committee to report any legislation required," the Committee have leave to say, that the investigation has not demonstrated to them the necessity of any change in the laws of the State, excepting possibly some future legislation to insure in future the speedy and severe punishment of those who misuse the great power of the public press and make it the disseminator of wanton and malicious libels.

We have received many hard words, and lost subscribers because we would not accept and endorse the Presidents policy. But our utterances of nearly a year ago, have been more than verified. The President is to-day without a party, and in Congress, when his veto was received there was not one in all the host of his once friends to do him reverence. No President, not even Andy Johnson, concealed, boasting, drunken bloated that he was, ever received such contemptuous treatment. Nothing can disguise the fact that the President has sacrificed every thing to please his enemies, and by so doing has harmed his friends. His enemies have been warmed to life by to sting him, and those to whom he threw pearls of conciliation turn to rend him. He is now powerless to help his once friends, who need help, and his enemies laugh at his calamity, and mock at his ineffectual efforts.

We have received from B. W. Richardson, one of the Committee of the W. J. G. Protective Society for distributing fish in the waters of West and South Jersey, a picture of the California Salmon, of one year old. It is a beautiful fish, and most excellent as an article of food. They have placed in our waters over a hundred thousand of them, and should they thrive, they will, in a few years furnish an abundance of the very best food. Let every law and order loving man act as a protector of our streams till that time arrives.

Mr. Linderman, the Ex-Secretary and Treasurer of the Narrow Gauge road, is charged with a deficiency in his accounts, according to statements recently made in the Philadelphia Record. We don't believe Mr. Linderman any such kind of a man. He has promised to give his statement, and to make things so plain, that no one can misunderstand them. By all means let's have both sides.

Thomas H. Morris of Somers Point, and Jos. L. Thompson of Hamilton, have been appointed Commissioners of Deeds.

Secretary Sherman, while opposed to the silver bill, believes it is said, that it will facilitate redemption without additional legislation, and hopes to defer action till a nearer time is fixed.

Bayard Taylor has been unanimously confirmed as Minister to Berlin.

The ex-rebels in Congress, have just achieved another victory, in the passage of a bill, granting pensions to all surviving officers and enlisted and drafted men, without regard to color, including militia and volunteers, in land and naval service, of the U. S., who served fourteen days, and were honorably discharged, and to their surviving widows, and restore to the pension rolls, all old pensioners who were dropped from it for taking up arms against the government, during the late rebellion, or in any way aiding the rebels, and provides for their widows. The next step is to place all disabled rebels, their widows and orphans on the roll, and the pay of rebel claims, and loyal men must pay it. It does seem as though our law-makers and other branches of government are bound to make treason no crime.

Monday, March 4, was the centennial anniversary of the birthday of Robert Emmet, one of Ireland's brave and noble patriots who proved his patriotism in the sacrifice of his life. He was put to death by the British government, for treason. His words uttered at his trial have been talismanic to the Irish, who still fondly cling to the hope of once more having an Irish nation, free from the trammels of England. The Irish World, published in New York City, makes the anniversary the occasion to illustrate its pages with the various scenes in the good man's life. Irishmen have reason to be proud of him.

The thirty-first annual report of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company has been made for the year 1877, which embraces the main line to Pittsburgh and branches covering a total length of 1055 miles; the untold railroads of New Jersey, 373; Delaware and Haritan Canal, 66 miles; the P. & E. Division, 278 miles; making in all, 1582 miles of railroad. The road earned \$6,999,925.50 net, but lost in the United States of New Jersey, and canal company, \$1,482,518.04. They show a surplus of \$1,208,008.20, to the credit of the income account after paying 84 per cent in dividends. The fixed obligations of the company upon leased lines and guaranteed securities amount to the enormous aggregate of \$185,016,293.11, and which there are \$118,016,293.11 in the sinking funds. On this net amount of \$180,512,933.11 the liabilities average seven and four-tenths per cent, or in round numbers, \$13,400,000. To meet this the net earnings last year were \$18,114,390.28, showing that even with the largely diminished earnings of 1877 there was a surplus of \$4,714,390.28 available for dividends and incidental charges.

This is a good showing when we consider the losses sustained by the company in the riots of last summer. A Washington correspondent relates that after the silver bill had passed the Senate over the veto, a number of the senators retired to the cloak room to compare notes. Eaton of Connecticut said, the next step of the western men will be "green backs" and then "repudiation." Stanley Matthews is going to present the first dollar coined under the new law to senator Eaton, to wear about his neck.

## Legislation.

In the Senate on Tuesday, bill No 1780 was introduced, respecting coroners. It amends the 20th section, and makes the coroner's fee for viewing a body \$8.00, 10 cent per mile, sitting with the jury, \$3 per day; burying a body, not exceeding \$10; witness and jury fees to be the same as in Justice's courts.

Mr. Gardner introduced bill No 100, an act to repeal an act entitled a further supplement to an act for the better protection of the agricultural interests of the county of Atlantic.

In the House, Mr. Miller introduced an act to establish standard packages for cranberries, to legalize the brand of the New Jersey Cranberry Growers' Association, and to prevent the marketing of this fruit in packages calculated to deceive the public.



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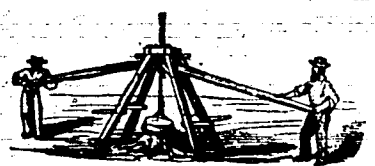
