Opponents of the proposed construction of bridges and roads connecting Atlantic City and Brigantine claim that this is a private real estate development being helped by public

Many County taxpayers are opposing the scheme alleging that it is being sponsored for the benefit of real estate interests who own large holdings at Brigantine and seek to have a necessary part of the development financed with funds from the

Judge J. J. White in an address before the Journalists Club opposed the spending of County money for the building up of what he referred to as "Bacharach Beach".

Proponents of the development point to a similar enterprise at Miami Beach, Florida. In this instance however millions of dollars of private capital were invested including the construction of the largest wooden bridge in the world by one of the developers Mr. John S. Collins of Moorestown, N. J., before the co-operation of the County was asked.

The sponsors also point to the additional increase in County ratables, resulting in additional taxes for the County, should the brovect materialize.






