Saloon Regulation.

The new liquor law provides that all
screens must be removed from saloons
on Sundays, and during other periods
that the sale of liquor may be prohib-
ited by law. Both the property and the
holder of the license are penalized, so
that neither can be licensed for one
year after a license shall be revoked
for any violation of law.

The back room is effectually wiped
out by a restriction which provides
that but one room shall be licensed,
and that room shall be either on the
first floor or in the basement of a
building, but must face on a public
street. No liquors can be served in
any other room.

The age at which saloon-keepers are
prohibited from selling to minors was
increased from 18 to 21 years.

A stricter provision is made concern-
ing the licensing of new places near
churches, schools, or armories, - it
being now provided that no such
license shall be granted within two
hundred feet of the outillage of such
building. Heretofore the measure-
ment was from the building itself.

An amendment inserted in the law
by Senator Avis fully described the
meaning of the law concerning hotels
and restaurants, and will guard against
any mushroom establishments such as
existed in New York under the Raffles
law.

Instead of requiring three persons
who are legal residents and voters to
make complaint for the purpose of
having a license revoked, the new law
provides that any two persons may
make such complaint. This makes it
possible for women, or for agents of
law and order societies, to make the
complaints.

A particularly strong feature of the
bill is that for violations the license
shall not only be revoked, but the
violation shall also be deemed guilty of
keeping a disorderly house.

Altogether, it makes very radical
changes in the legal regulation of the
liquor traffic, and there are doubtless
very few who realize the extent of the
remedial legislation.

This new law will go into effect on
July 4th.

A Chapter of Accidents.

One of our town physicians reports the following for the past week:
A small boy residing at Reasdale was run into by a motorcyclist carrying No. 947. The boy's knee and scalp were badly cut.
Gus Miller had his left hand terribly mangled in a buzz saw, at the Reasdale mill. He will lose his thumb and part of his hand.
Italian No. 2345 fell from the work train near Winslow, and was unconscious when picked up. One ear was badly mangled, and his forehead cut for about two inches.
Henry Burr was sent to Cooper Hospital for an operation on his left leg, due to blood-poisoning.

About 11:30, Thursday morning, the local telephone ring sounded a fire alarm, which was quickly followed by the large bell. The scene of the conflagration was two and a-half miles distant on the old Anderson farm, Middle Road, now owned by Allen Schoch. Both fire companies made record time, Volunteer Company getting to the scene twelve minutes from the time of alarm. The alarm had been sent too late, as the large barn (24 x 40 feet) and corn crib were enveloped in flames, leaving nothing for the firemen to do but return home, after seeing that the house was not in danger. How the fire started is not known. Mr. Schoch blistered his hand while saving property. A half-dozen hens were the only livestock lost.

Thursday, as Fell Loveland, in his Delaware River, a woman came out on the pier, throw down her purse, and leaped into the water. Fell backed to the wharf, took on a policeman, who twice attempted to grasp the sinking form, but failed. As she was disappearing the third time, Fell let his engine, seized the woman by the hair, and succeeded in saving her.

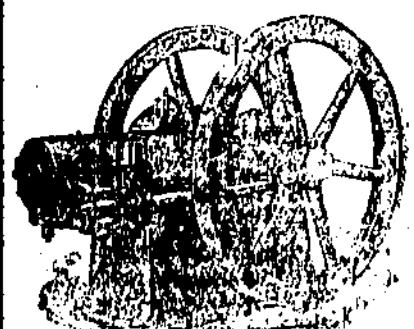
