Saloon Regulation.

The new liquer law provides that all creens must be removed from seloons on Sundays, and during other periods that the sale of liquor may be prohibited by law. Both the property and the holder of the license are penalized, so that neither can be licensed for one vearafter a license shall be revoked for any violation of laws from

The back room is effectually wiped out by a restriction which provides that but one room shall be Beensed, and that room shall be either on the first floor or in the basement of a building, but must face on a public street. No liquors can be served in any other room.

The age at which saloon-keepers are prohibited from selling to minors was increased from 18 to 21 years.

A stricter provision is made concerning the licensing of new places near - echoole. being now provided that no such license shall be granted within two hundred feet of the ourtilage of such building. Heretofore the measurement was from the building itself.

An amendment Inserted in the law by Senator Avis fully described the meaning of the law concerning hotels and restaurants, and will guard against any mushroom establishments such as existed in New York under the Raines

Instead of requiring three persons who are legal residents and votors to make complaint for the purpose of having a license revoked, the new law provides that any two persons may make such complaint. This makes it possible for women, or for agents of law and order secleties, to make the complain*ts*.

A particularly strong feature of the bill in that for violations the license shall not only be reveked, but the violator shall also be deemed guilty of keeping a disorderly house.

Altogether, it makes very radical changes in the legal regulation of the liquor traffic, and there are doubtlest very few who realize the extent of the remedial legislation

This new law will go into offect of July 4th.




