

REGARD GOLD AS WORTHLESS

Ordinary money is entirely unknown mongst the inhabitants of some of the more remote Fijian islands in the South Pacific ocean, its place being taken by plug tobacco-so many sticks being worth one pig or one wife, as the case may be, writes Col. T. R. St. Johnston, formerly district commissloper for Fill.

One day a trading schooner put in at Apemama island having on board a goat, a beast never before seen by the astonished eyes of the natives.

To please the "king" of the place the trader made him a present of the animal, which, as is the playful habit of goats, had been accustomed to chew up anything offered to it, even to-"What do you feed it on?" ask the

Somewhere in Fiji there exist rich gold deposits, but no one knows their whereabouts, for the natives are extraordinarily reticent regarding this one subject. Colonel St. Johnson tells of the following remarkable incident: One day a trader brought him two specimens of quartz richly veined with gold. They had been hidden in one of a number of bags of copra (dried coconut) brought in by some natives; the object being, not to smuggle the gold, but to add to the weight of the contents of the bag, and so defraud the nurchaser.

The colonel himself tested the specinens, which proved to be very rich indeed in the precious metal. The trader at once began to make inquiries as to who had put "stones" in their sack of copra, but the natives imagined of trap, and not one would own up, despite his offer of "no awkward questions and a rich reward." And to this day the mystery has never been solved.

Wind Caused by the Sun

Town Council has the power of deciding all questions of legislative policy and many other details of town government. Noother body, group or organization has this power on subjects within the jurisdiction of Council. But power also carries with it responsibility and the people having given the power of decision to Council rightly expect that it will be used,

This is an inconvenience to citizens who are interested and may wish to follow the ordinance through its various stages. The hundreds of people who use this street hope that it will be fixed at once.

Bucyrus, Ohio. - Jacob P. Menges charged with keeping his twenty-six year-old daughter, Irene, in a dingy mokehouse for two years because she wouldn't beliave," has been found guilty of excessive cruelty by a jury in Judge Rummels' court. The girl, said to have been driven insone by the long confinement, is now an inmate of the State hospital at Toledo.

The case grew out of the fact that on May 5, Sheriff Edward J. Knappenberger went to the Menges home, midway between Gation and Crestline, and found the girl, partly nude, in a smokehouse near the barn. The shed contained little but a cot and blanket.

frene was brought to Bucyrus, where she was cared for by Mrs. Knappenberger, wife of the sheriff. She was reported to show signs of long neglect May 16 she was sent to the State hospital and Monges was arrested on a state warrant charging cruelty. Family Fought Raiders.

Chester A. Meck, Crawford county prosecutor states that the case is brought under state law, making the

finding of the justice court final. The release of Irene attracted widespread attention, as the statements made by county officials at the time revealed that the girl bad been a prisoner in the shack for a long time, reports as to the duration of her captivity varying from two to six years. 
