

NOTICE OF ORDINANCE

n Ordinance, Relating to the Construction of Certain Streets, of the Town of Ham-monton, New Jersey.

"Egg Harbor Road between Bellevue and Orchard Street; Horton Street between Bellevue Avenue and Orchard Street; Second Street between Vine Street; Second Street; and Third Street and Orchard Street; and Third Street between French Street and Central Avenue; with reinforced concrete, not less than even inches thick; and for the placing of a concrete curb, and constructing enterets gutters on both aldes of the said Streets; to make an appropriation for the tunds necessary for said purposes, and to provide for the assessment of benefits for said improvements,

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor and the Common Council of the Town of Hammonton, New Jersey:

SECTION 1. The following Streets, or sections of Streets in the Town of Hammonton. New Jetsey, shall be payed with reinforced concrete, not less than seven inches thick, and concrete curbs and gutters, according to the plans and specifications, prepared by Remington and Vosbury, Consulting Engineers, dated May first, 1922, and now on the in the office of the Town Clerk, of the Town of Hammonton: Egg Harbor Road between Bellevue Avenue and Orchard Street; Borton Street between Vine Street and Orchard Street; and Third Street between French Street and Central Avenue.

SECTION 7. That the paving of said Streets, curbs and gutters, as set forth in this Ordinanca, shall be constructed, built, laid and installed, as a local improvement, and when completed, the costs of said improvements, shall, in the manaer provided by Law, be assessed against the owner of the lands and real estate deriving egiefits therefrom, in proportion to the peculiar benefit, or advantage or increase in value, which the respective lands or parcels of land or real estate shall be deemed to receive, by reason of such improvements; but in no case shall any assessment on any parcel of land, exceed the amount of such peculiar benefit, advantage or increase. Upon the completion of the assessments therefor, in the manner provided by Law, such assessments shall become immediately due and payable.

SECTION 8. The assessments as SECTION 2. IT IS HEREBY ORDERED AND DIRECTED, that in all Streets or portions thereof mentioned in Section 1, of this Ordinance, where sewer, gas or water mains or conduits for wires are located, or may be located subsequent to the passage

where sewer, gas or water mains or conduits for wires are located, or may be located subsequent to the passage of this Ordinance, prior to the making of said improvement, and where, in order to make private connections therewith, it will thereafter be necessary to excavate and tear up the proposed improved Streets or portions thereof, the owners of all lands on the line of said proposed improvement shall make the necessary connections with said sewers, gas and water mains and conduits for wires in said Streets and portions thereof, for all lands not already connected therewith, before the work upon said improvement shall be begun and which connections shall be made within thirty-days after notice from the Town Clerk so to do, provided that at least one connection shall be made of every fifty feet, and also one connection for each subdivision of land having a frontage of less than fifty feet. Where there are no curbs along the line of the proposed improvement, and the construction of the new curbs is deemed necessary and is called for on the plans, the same shall be constructed by abutting property owners, in accordance with the specifications on file in the office of the Town Clerk, within thirty days after notice from the Town Clerk so to do. In case the owner or owners of any lands for which connections are hereby ordered to be made or curbs constructed, shall not comply of the Town Cherk so to do.
