

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

When, last Tuesday, we laid to est the body of Edward batchelor. we hid from view one of the most respected citizens, a faithful husband and a kind father.

My first acquaintance with Mr. Batchelor dates back to 1900, when he became a councilman, appointed to fill a vacaucy. He at once took a live interest in town masters, always working for the town's good.

The late Alexander H. Sutton was President at that time, but he died the year following, and I succeeded him in office. One of my first official acts on assuming my seat was to appoint Mr. Batchelor chairman of the Law and Order Committee, and as this position carried with it police powers, he : t pace started in to rid the town of camps and evil-doers, and enforcing the town laws to the limit. He not only acted as policeman in the case, but as prosecutor at the trial. Along with this work he investigated every application for a franbise, whether it was hotel, gas, electricity of water, and quite fremently travelled all over the state and adjoing states in search of data for the town's benefit. In this work he would spend his own money and refused to be reimbursed.

Upon the death of Freeholder L. Hurd Parkhurst, Council appointed [Ar. Batchelor to succeed him, and i's work on the board is a matter

For years he was an active fireman, ever ready to do his part of the strengous and hazardous work of a fireman. He never regarded his own safety, and when ill-health compelled him to resign from active duty, it was a source of regret to all his fellow workers.

The Postal Telegraph Company testify to his long and faithful (fully two score years) service with them. He continued making his daily trips until about six weeks ago when he had a collapse from which he never recovered.

I could say more, but this is sufficient to remind us of the nature of our loss. Would that we had more Batchelors in our midst.
