## TOWN MEETING.

As is the custom, we had a public town meeting on Thursday evening; and everybody had a hand in it.

P. H. Jacobs was elected chairman; Dr. Cunningham secretary.

Petitions for lights were received from Valley Ave., lower Central Ave. to the Lake, and First Road. Referred to Council.

The following appropriations were endorsed:

Highways, \$3000.

Fire Department, \$1000

Street Lights, \$2800 (\$300 added to Council's figures.)

Town Purposes, \$1600 (\$1000 to be taken from Surplus Fund and added to this.)

Poor, \$1200.

Park Improvement, \$500 (\$200 added to Council's figure.)

Memorial Day, \$50.

Resolution adopted, that Council be asked to call special town meeting before granting franchise to any lighting company.

Committee of five was appointed to look up subject of improved government. The gentlemen named were A. J. Rider, W. H. Bernsbouse, J. A. Burgan, M. L. Jackson, and Samuel Anderson. They will report at a special town meeting.

Voted, that the question of license — for and against — be placed on the ticket.

The electric light contract expires Jan. 1st. Mr Starr stated that they would demonstrate, before then, that with steam they could give satisfactory service.

There was much talk, motions and amendments by the dozen, but no loss of temper, and no bloodshed.
