

He formally left the Republican party when President Hard ng was nomi nated and the only intimation that Republicans of New Jersey had that he had returned to it, was when he announced his candidacy for nomination to the United

"I believe it to be to the best inferests of all the people in New Jersey to have Joseph S. Fredinghuyson re-turned to the sonate."



MANY RECEIVERS LEFT OFF THE HOOK

Over 200,000 'Phone Users in Penna., N. J. and Del. Forgot Them Las: Year.

During the year 1921 more than 200,000 telephone receivers were care-lessly left off the book by telephone bases in Pen' sylvania, Delaware and New Jersey. Some of them forgot to replace the

"receiver after finishing a conversation; some left the telephone before finish-'ing and forgot to come back; others placed the telephone so that the receiver, although on the hook, rested upon a book or magazine and did not fully depress the book. There are many others reasons why receiver are left off the mook, but in each case the result was the same. The operathe result was the same. The opera-tor received a steady signal and get-ting no response to her "Number, please," she reported the line out of order and the "how'er" was applied to the telephone. The howier is an instrument which when connected to a telephone before the receiver of the a telephone having the receiver off the book causes a shrill, whistling sound to come from the receiver. If some-body hears the noise and hangs up the

receiver all is well. However, if the howler fails to at tract attention it is necessary for repairman to make a trip to the of-fending telephone, which means that the service from that telephone is cu off until he gets there. For it is ne -cessary to "plug out" the line in order to put out the signal light before the

It requires anywhere from five min utes to five hours to correct each o these cases. The average was twenty minutes. That means that on the ave age each one of those 200,000 tele phones was out of service for twenty minutes. Thus 4,000,000 minutes of telephone service was lost by these subscribers last year because they fornot to hang up the receiver.
