## Presbyterian Banquet.

An event of unusual interest and  
importance was held on last Tuesday  
evening, in the parlor of the Presby-  
terian Church, when some thirty-five  
men assembled at a banquet, as guests  
of the Ushers' Union. The room was  
prettily decorated with plants, ferns  
and cypripediums, and American  
flags. The tables were arranged at  
the farther end, allowing space for the  
reception of guests.

The banquet was served promptly  
at 6.45, in a number of courses, by the  
ladies, who deserve great credit for  
their efficient work and very tasteful  
arrangements.

After the feasting, Pastor Stewart,  
in a few well chosen words of wit and  
wisdom, introduced the speakers of the  
evening, Messrs. H. C. Gara and Allan  
Sutherland, two prominent laymen of  
Philadelphia.

The first named dwelt upon the im-  
portance of an organization or brother-  
hood of men, the good that can thus  
be accomplished for themselves, their  
followers, and the Church. He gave  
instances during his experience in  
assisting in the organization of some  
forty-two men's societies in and about  
Philadelphia, and the good resulting  
therefrom. His own society started  
with a membership of sixteen, a few  
years ago, and now has ninety-three  
enrolled.

He attributed the failure of so many  
so-called Christian societies to the fact  
that they were athletic or social or-  
ganizations with a spiritual attach-  
ment. Rather should the spiritual  
interest be the prominent one.

Mr. Sutherland spoke of the neces-  
sity of personal work, the interest  
each should feel in the welfare of the  
other, especially those outside of the  
Church, in bringing them to a know-  
ledge of Christ.

Both speakers interspersed their  
remarks with witty anecdotes, which  
called forth repeated applause, and  
making the evening enjoyable and  
profitable to all.

Our only regret was that the nine  
o'clock train, on which our friends  
departed, could not wait until eleven.

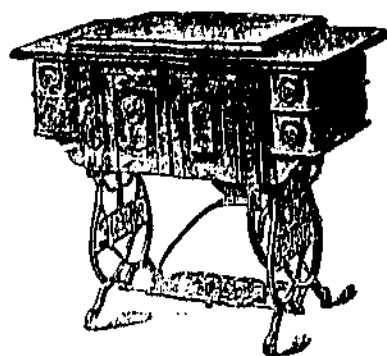

## Post-Office Notice.

Attention is called to the following amendment to the Postal Laws and Regulations:

BOX RENTS.  
October 13th, 1906.

Order No. 1281.

Paragraph 2, Sec. 348, Postal Laws and Regulations, amended to read as follows:

"Box rents must be collected at the beginning of each quarter for the entire quarter, but no longer. Ten days before the last day of each quarter postmasters are required to place a bill bearing the date of the last day of the quarter in each rented box. If a box holder fails to renew his right to his box on or before the last day of a quarter, the box shall then be closed and offered for rent, and the mail will be placed in the general delivery."

In compliance with the above order, all box rents must be paid before the first of the quarter.

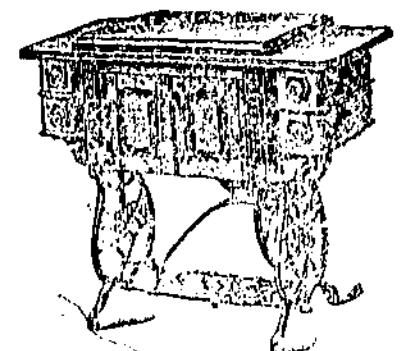
