Silk More Fires.

About noon, last Saturday, both companies were called to W. B. MacDougal's, at Main and Oak Roads, where they found the grove and storage house afire, and a gasoline tank, other outbuildings and the residence in danger. The tank was already very hot, and its platform ablaze, yet the men fought it out with chemicals, and cooled off the blistered tank. 
