Raise Auto License Fees?

That the Legislature should lose no time in remedying the several defects of the present reciprocity automobile law is the opinion of Job/H, Lippincott, State Commissioner of Mo tor Vehicles, set forth in his annual report to the degislature. One of the suggestions be offers is that the license see should be raised so as to provide a further incerease of \$100,000 to the half-million dollars collected in 1912. In Beethoven's fifth symphony, with which the concert was opened, the orchestra appeared at its best, the spleidid leadership of Stokowski asserting itself in the musterly sub jection of the large body of musicians to the demands of his interpretation. No better comment can be made on the performance of this, Beathoven's greatest work, than to say that it was played in such a manner that all could enjoy it. The remainder of the program however, was largely a condescension to the lighter demands of the public and savored more of the orchestra's "popular concerts than its regular performances. The excellent rendition of two Hungarlan Dances by Brahms was the feature of the second part of the program, the tediousness of which was at times apparent in the large audience, but which was elleved by a rather lax performance of Wieniawski's "Gypsy Concerto" by Thadeus Rich, concertmeister of the orchestra, a composition hardly worth, however, a place on a symphony program. Taken as a whole, the concert was certainly a big success, but it is to be hoped that at its next performance the orchestra will pay a higher tribute of respect o the musical taste of the people of Atlantic Ity and County by arranging a more con sistent symphonic program.

SAYS COURT.

Five Hundred Dollars Damages Awarded Mother by Jury for Loss of Child - Action Over Hotel Lease Suddenly Terminated.

A non-suit was directed by Judge Cole in Brouit Court Thursday in the case of the West fersey and Seashore Railroad Company, against the Board of Water Commissioners of Atlantic City. Judge Cole directed the nonsuit on argument advanced by Acting City rieg, North side of Arctic Ave. 25 ft. East of Solicitor Lee F. Washington that the suit had been brought against the Water Commissioners of the city, a non-sucable body in that it was not a corporation. Acting on the advice of Justice Kalisch, Mr. Washington asked that asso, of Longbort, 74,68x115 ft. West side of the hearing on the case be postponed for a week, but Judge Cole ruled that it must go on. This was rather unexpected to the City Solicitor as he had no witnesses present. He condue ted his case purely along the line of objections during the trial

Mr. Bourgeois, for the company, produced a contract which he claimed had been entered into by the city with the company. This was objected to by Mr. Washington on the grounds that the suit was against the Water Commisstoners and not the city, and was ruled out by Judge Cole. An attempt to introduce letters which had passed prior to the contract signing was also made by Mr. Bourgeols, but a ruling of Judge Cole was obtained holding that nction was based on the contract and that it therefore was the only basis for action. Mr. Washington moved for a non-suit and his motion was unopposed, Judge Cole promptly

granted it, and the jury was discharged. The suit involved only \$3,000 but was important in the bearing it has on actions pending before the Supreme Court. The company. through its attorney, had recured a judgment for some \$22,000 against the city and Thursday's suit was for interest and costs on this. The action of Judge Cole is taken by attorneys to be an indication that a re-opening of the judgment for the \$22,000 may be granted by

the Superior Courts. Damages to the amount of \$500 were awarded Mrs. Bessie Bailine, as administratrix of the estate of four-year-old Hyman Bailine, by a jury hist Tuesday, following completion of the action of law brought by Mrs. Bailine against the Atlantic Construction Company, through whose negligence, according to the com-plainant, the death of the little one was caused, The lad fell into a sewer manbole and was drowned.

American Hotel and Garden Company came to an abrupt end Wednesday, when W. I. Garrison, counsel for the plaintiff, endeavored to introduce evidence that his client had suffered a loss because of inability to heat ome of the bedrooms of the hotel. The introduction of such evidence was opposed by Mr. Bourgeois, coupsel for the Hotel Company, and Judge Cole said that inasmuch as the case has been misupprehended by counsel for the plaintiff, the only thing to do was to withdraw a juror and end the case for the term, which was done. The original claim for the damages was on the fact that the kitchen was too small to properly serve the guests of the hotel. Civil Court was adjourned yesterday until
