Senator E. A. Wilson Introduces Liberal Measure Aimed To Promote Welfare of Atlantic City-Does Not Conflict With Others.

Another liberal excise bill was introduced

Monday in the Legislature by Senator Edward A. Wilson, of this County, who brought before the Senate a measure aimed to promote the welfare of Atlantic City by permitting liquor to be served Sunday with meals. It is a supplement to the Werts Law, subject to the regulations of that statute, and does not in any way conflict with existing laws or other excise bills before the Legislature. In many respects it is similar to the bill introduced last week in the House by Assemblyman Walter E. Edge. There are now three excise bills before the

Legislature and indications point to the introduction of several more. As all the bills aim at the one result, a liberal excise statute calculated for the best interests of seashore resorts, it is likely that out of the several proposed measures one bill will be formulated and enacted into a law. Speaking of the new bill, Senator Wilson said; "The introduction of my excise-bill means

that Atlantic City and the other coast resorts knocking at the doors of the Legislature for remedial legislation want something that will permit our people to join the great army of law-abiding citizens of New Jersey. It is the same bill I introduced two years ago, and also last year, and is the result of a thorough investigation of the excise proposition from a resort standpoint. "It is the same bill which, two yars ago,

# WATKINS TO BAR FOR KILLING ERNEST CROWN

SHERIFF JOHNSON.

Self-defense Will Be Plea of Negro Defendant Charged With Fatal Shooting at "Donkey Party" In

It is alleged by the defense that Watkins, who was employed at the saloon of Daniel Shuggs, 1920 Baltic Avenue, went to the aid of his employer, who was attacked by Crown because a "donkey-party" had been postponed. 
