PICKEREL SEASON NOW OPEN.

Gamey Fresh Water Warriers Lawful Prey For Anglers.

With the opening of the season in New Jer rey for pike and pickerel to-day, which will remain open now until the last of November next, anglers in the fresh water streams and inkes will sally forth armed with minnows strips of salt pork and red flannel or bright spoon-hooks to capture this gamey fish, so abundant in the waters of Lake Lenape and the Great Egg Harbor River. Many anglers will be seen along the streams this morning, coaxing the wiley fish out from their retreat in the reeds and by the side of logs where they

Although these fish are much sought after during the long open season and many captured, their number does not seem to materially decrease, as they multiply rapidly and thrive well in these waters. The best fishing is found several miles up the river above the lake, towards Weymouth, where many large fellows were hooked last season. It is a good policy to throw back all small fish that are hooked, for they will not die and some day will afford good sport for someone who is lucky enough to connect with them with a rod and line when they are full grown.
