An alarm of a man committing sucide by jumping into the lake was given Monday aftermoon by four boys, Sam, Clarence and Norman Henry and Harry Wetherby, who were on the take in a row boat. They said the man came down the bank near the home of William Goebel, waded out knee-deep, pulled his hat over his eyes and plunged head first into deep water. When he did not reappear the boys gate, Sooy; Struck out by Edwards 0; Gegan notified several persons, who searched for the body the next day. Finding no trace of it, they surmised that the boys were mistaken and the incident was half-forgotten until the body was washed ashore yesterday. It was probably dislodged from the bottom by the severe storm Thursday night.

Monday morning an aged man entered the Prentiss restaurant on Main Street, where he left an old-fashioned hand-bag, saying he was going up the street a short distance and would call for it in a little while. He did not return, however, and the grip was permitted to remain in the store, no one connecting it with the rumor of the suicide. The description of the man who left the grip at the store tallied with that of the body found vesterday.

There was nothing on the body to directly identify the man. He was dressed in a dark suit, flannel shirt, black shoes and light underelothing. No money was found in his ketbook, but there was forty-two cents in change in his pockets. A pawn ticket, issued to Mr. Smith by the Rettews Pawn Shop, 28 N. 11th Street, Philadelphia, bearing the number 341.597 issued June 2 on a watch for three dollars, was found in his coat pocket. There were also found a pocket knife, keys, watch chain, comb and handkerchief. A pair of gold-rimmed glasses with the name L. C. Wetting, Newtown, Pa., were also found on the body.

In the suit case left at the restaurant which bears the initials, "I. F. MEETING.

Meadow Boulevard Bridges To Be Safeguarded by Rebuilding and Placing of Green Lights—Pavement Plans Approved.

Pursuing the progressive policies that have characterised the people of Atlantic County heretofore as leaders in the good roads campaign, the Board of Chosen Freeholders, at the June meeting held Wednesday last at Atlantic fity, voted to raise \$20,000 more for the maintenance of good roads and bridges. The resolution was introduced by Frank Enderlin, Chairman of the Bridge Committee, who suggested increasing the bridge appropriation \$10,000 at the same time adding a like amount to the budget for road maintenance. Originally the annual budget for bridges was \$13,000, but this amount was increased to \$23,000 at the Board's May meeting by the addition of \$10,000. Improvements already contemplated by the Board, however, will utilize something like \$20,000, leaving but a small amount for future expenditures and it is deemed necessary to

provide a fund to meet future needs. Answering a question of Freeholder Anderson Bourgeois, who inquired the object of raising the budget, Harry Coulomb, representing Solicitor E. A. Higbee, explained the reason by stating that owing to the County's inability to procure State aid for present road improvements, the money for paving the Boulevard, which it is proposed to pave a short distance as an experiment, had to be raised by other means. Said Mr. Coulomb: "Up until 1910 the entire cost of road main-

tenance devolved upon the County. Then anmitted the State to appropriate money from the automobile fund, provided the proposed improvements were extraordinary repairs. The State Road Commissioner is empowered to appropriate money from the automobile fund for this purpose if, in his judgment, the. repairs are necessary and are extraordinary. The act also provides that the county may raise * similar amount by bonds.
