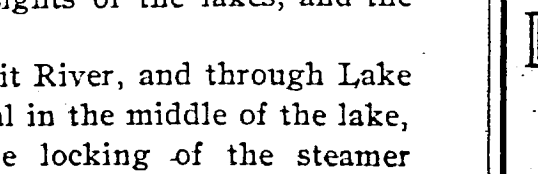

Notice of Fire Alarms.

The fire whistle is to be blown for fire alarm only. The alarm signals are as follows: 1 short blast, North of Fire Station; 2 short blasts, East of Fire Station; 3 short blasts, South of Fire Station; 4 short blasts, West of Fire Station.

All blasts are to be preceded with one long blast as an alarm of fire. In blowing the alarm the first blast must be made carefully in order to prevent damage to the whistle.
