"FLOATED" OYSTERS MUST BE LABELED.

Bureau by Government—Amend-Along the Seacoast.

New Jersey oystermen have scored a victory in the modification of the national order prothe modified order were sent to Chief Bacon. The configuration from Washington read

as follows "Considerable evidence has been submitted to the department since the issuance of food inspection decision 110 on the practice of floating or drinking oysters in water of less saline content than that in which they were grown

"Full consideration has been given to all the hearings and to the briefs and other information submitted subsequent to the hearings and the board is of the opinion that it is not improper to drink oysters of a saline content clearly and legibly labeled 'floated oysters,' otherwise they will be considered adulterated under section 7 of the law.

"Particular attention should be paid by the growers and handlers of oysters to the characton Main Street. ter of the water in which the oysters are brought to maturity or floated. Where such waters are polluted, it will invariably follow that the oysters will also partake of this pollution and subsequent washing of the oysters, or even floating in water which is not polluted is likely not to cleanse them of this pollution.

"Oysters found in interstate commerce in polluted condition because of the character of the water in which they are grown or floated, are adulterated under the food and drugs act. "Criticism is general in almost every community of the State by parents, by practical and professional people and particularly by newspapers and by all persons who have given the subject attention that the scholars in our public schools are overburdened with work; that their studies are too numerous and too complex for them to properly absorb, with the result of an imperfect knowledge of many subjects.

"There is general complaint that the studies are not sufficiently practical to be of much avail in the ordinary affairs of life, and that the great majority of scholars undertake the burdens of life at an early age-about when graduated from the grammar grades-and by reason of the above conditions are sent forth imperfectly equipped."

Justice Charles G. Garrison, or the State Supreme Court, has declared illegal the contract for the improvement of the Shore Road from Absecon to Somers Point, awarded by the Board of Freeholders to Bryant Reilly, because the contract was not in accordance with the law of 1965, under which statute it was awarded. The case came up to the Supreme Court on a writ of certiorari reviewing the proceedings by which the contract was awarded. Thompson & Cole represented William L. Black, the prosecutor. The Freeholders were represented by Judge E. A. Higbee and Harry Coulomb, and Bryant Reilly was represented by John J. Crandali. The opinion




