OLD COUNTY RESIDENT DIED AT EIGHTY-FIVE

MRS. HESTER THOMPSON WAS WIDELY KNOWN:

Born In Pennington Homestead She Lived Here Half Century—Special Train Will Convey Remains to Final Resting Place.

Death claimed one of the County's oldest and most respected residents yesterday afternoon, when Mrs. Hester Taylor Thompson, widow of the late William W. Thompson and daughter of Capt. John Pennington and Elizabeth Taylor, passed away at the Munceaster, St. James Place, Atlantic City, in her eighty-fifth year. Mrs. Thompson had been bed-ridden for nearly a year and the end was not altogether unexpected.

She was born October 30, 1825, in the old Pennington homestead that stood on the river road until a year or so ago, when it was torn down because of its decayed condition. Residing on this farm for a greater part of her long life, she enjoyed the friendship and respect of a large number of County residents, and was known at least by sight to almost everyone who lived in this neighborhood. Although during the last years of her life she has resided at Atlantic City, she has frequently spent the Summer here at the Moore Villa.

Mrs. Thompson is survived by three children: Mrs. Hannah Moore, ex-Judge Joseph Thompson and Miss Eliza Scott Thompson, also two grandchildren, Charles Moore, Miss Minnie Moore, Mrs. E. E. Lauther, of Pittsburgh, John and William Thompson. Services will be held Monday next at 2:45 P. M. from her late residence, after which the body will be conveyed to this place by a special train and interment made in the Presbyterian Cemetery.

The first court sessions of Atlantic County were held in the old Pennington homestead, only a few years after her birth, and she witnessed the gradual growth of her native town as the County Capitol, the decline of shipping after the railroad was built and knew personally many of the old captains who sailed vessels from this place, built at local shipyards and often manned by local sailors. Her memory of the old Lady Carteron, of Great Egg Harbor probably dated back further than that of any person now living.

More About Flies on Food.

DEAR SIR:—In all this hue and cry about getting rid of the house-fly and keeping the pests from the food on the table, there is one point that seems to have been overlooked and that I would like to emphasize if right here: How, in the name of all that is good to eat, can house-wives keep their food clean when it has been covered with filthy flies while laying on store counters waiting to be sold?

I have gone into markets, not very far away either, and seen steaks, ham and other meats on the butcher's block, filthy bins with swarms of flies; I have looked into cases where bakery products were exposed, and "fly pie" was the only kind I could see—the storekeeper himself had to scoop the flies away before he could tell apple from lemon.

Some of the storekeepers, I am glad to say, are more careful. I suggest that housekeepers make a note of those who keep their wares clean and free from any of their pestiferous groceries at those places. If they are unpolished when they are purchased, we have some chance of getting them into our stomachs free of filth and germs.
