NORTHFIELD THREATENS DICED

Should the Egan road not be carried in New Jersey at the next election, providing for the permanent improvement of certain highways, the Board of Freeholders will be prepared to proceed immediately with the project for paving the boulevard from Absecon to the Camden County line.

Members of the Penn Memorial Bridge Commission, who are endeavoring to raise funds for a preliminary survey for a bridge across the Delaware River from Camden to Philadelphia, were here before the Board Wednesday and asked that Atlantic County donate \$2,500 for the project.

The contract was awarded to Charles Corson for building a concrete wall facing the Court House and grounds at this place. The wall is to be eighteen inches high and to extend a like depth underground.

Although the New Jersey Legislature failed to pass the cat license law last winter, several municipalities have declined to wait for the State to lead the way but have adopted local ordinances levying a fee tax. ITEMS OF INTEREST TO COUNTY FARMERS

AGRICULTURE SUGGESTIONS AND RECENT RURAL HAPPENINGS

Atlantic County farmers have had a hard row to hoe in more ways than one. This is literally true, for without scientific treatment the soil in the county has been generally poor.

This year, however, conditions are vastly better. One farmer back of the Shore Road between Pleasantville and Absecon was able to sell his tomatoes and egg plants at a dollar per half-bushel basket, which was far better than he could do the year previous.

Don't forget the Granger's Plover Lelling's Park, May's Landing, on August 11 and the Hammonton Field Day at Hammonton Park, September 9. Every farmer should attend both these meetings. To make them the greatest success, the hearty co-operation of everyone in the county is solicited.

It is claimed by a number of experiment stations that salt will, to a great extent, replace peat; but this is uncertain under all conditions and in all types of soil.

A short time ago Prof. Blake issued a circular on "Suggested Grades for Peaches." This circular should be in every peach grower's hands before the busy season opens; and after it is secured, it should be studied thoroughly by the grower.

Those who wish to sow alfalfa this year should "get busy" at once and prepare the soil. The demonstrator will be glad to extend assistance.

STATE-WIDE FIGHT AGAINST SPREAD OF INFANTILE PARALYSIS

CHILDREN MUST HAVE CERTIFICATES IN ORDER TO TRAVEL

NO OUTBREAK AT THIS PLACE SEVERAL NEW YORK FAMILIES HAVE MOVED HERE RECENTLY

LOCAL QUARANTINE PROBABLE

PARENTS URGED TO TAKE PRECAUTIONS AGAINST CONTAGION

No word has yet been received by the local Board of Health as to the enforcement of the State quarantine against infantile paralysis, under the action taken Wednesday by the State Board of Health. The law, Trenton reports, requires local Boards of Health to enforce the provisions of the sanitary code.

During the last two days, three families have moved here from New York City with their household goods and so far as is known no steps were taken at either end to guard against the disease being spread through these sources.

The recent action taken by the State Board provides that children under 16 years of age shall not be permitted to enter the State, or pass from one municipality to another within the State, unless accompanied by certificates issued by competent health authorities.

In order to prevent the further spread of the disease, the following measures of precaution are recommended by health authorities: Cleanliness should be continuously maintained in and about the home.

Children should be prevented from assembling in large numbers and should not be permitted to attend public gatherings.
