FARMING MADE TO PAY.

Scientific Methods Can Reclaim Large Areas of Jersey Soil. All over the State there is a decided tendency

This may be done directly by fertilization or by a proper rotation of crops.

> One trouble with the soil of this part of New Jersey is its tendency to dry out, but this can be overcome by irrigation. The latter has not been given a fair trial, especially on the farms in this district, and it is certain that properly established such a system would cause the average Atlantic County farm to yield good crops. It is not so often the fault of the soil as Ave. 31. of the farmer that he cannot make his farm pay. So many things enter into the question of getting a profit from his vegetables that he is apt to overlook some small but important details. Not the least of these is the selection of crops adaptable to the soil of his farm.

Large areas of swamp and meadow land in Atlantic County can be reclaimed by drainage, either for the purpose of growing eranberries or for crops that grow well on heavy, wet soil. The soil that comes from the conversion of swamp bottom into farm land is usually rich, although it generally requires treatment before it becomes suitable for trucking. When the land is finally prepared for planting, the most judicious selection of vegetables should be made, and herein lies one of the secrets of the successful farmer; he finds out what his land will raise and what it will not and plants accordingly. There is doubtless a great future for the truck farms of this section of the State if they are tilled in the light of modern methods of agriculture.
