

MENACE TO SHORE IN WHARTON TRACT SALE

GARDNER SOUNDS ALARM TO HALT RUIN.

A two-line item printed in a Philadelphia newspaper a few days ago contained a piece of information of startling import to the people of South Jersey. In plain words it announced the purchase by the New Jersey Water Commission of the old Wharton tract, lying in Atlantic and Burlington Counties, consisting of over 10,000 acres, and containing the source of the most abundant and absolutely pure supply of drinking water North of Chesapeake Bay.

It is announced that this great watershed has been purchased for the benefit of the people of Camden, Gloucester and probably other cities to the North and West of those comprising the Second Congressional District, which is composed of Atlantic, Cumberland, Cape May and Burlington Counties. It is the expressed intention of the Commission to divert these waters from the Southwestern to the Western watershed.

But that is not the immediate nor calculated effect that would follow the adoption of this scheme by the Water Commission. The fact that the Wharton tract is the source of the most abundant and absolutely pure supply of drinking water North of Chesapeake Bay, is a fact that is not generally known.

GRAND JURY STARTS PROBE.

Eleven Bills Returned Wednesday On Testimony of Majane and Burns Detectives—Court Takes More Pleas.

Burns and his operatives in Atlantic City for graft in connection with public contracts, license granting and other phases of municipal business was begun Wednesday before the Grand Jury, Attorney General Edmund Wilson and his assistant, H. Nelson (Smith), aided by Charles Moore, foreman of the eleven-member grand jury, were recently extradited from the West and a number of Burns' detectives were before the grand jury, which after an all day session held in the Court House and guarded against intrusion by a half-dozen constables adjourned until September 25 when the probe will be continued.
