

MUCH WORK AHEAD FOR OCTOBER COURT TERM

THREE HOMICIDE CASES BEFORE GRAND JURY.

Long Docket of Offenders Charged With Larceny, White Slavery, Assault and Other Crimes and Misdemeanors.

The large number of prisoners held for the action of the Grand Jury, together with the long list of civil cases, promise a long term for the court. The first case which will probably fall until the winter term, Supreme Court Judge Thomas W. Trenchard, of Bridgeton, will officially open the October Term Tuesday morning next and charge the Grand Jury, after that body, drawn by Sheriff E. L. Johnson, has been called and sworn by County Clerk Samuel Kirby. Law Judge Enoch Higbee will sit with Justice Trenchard and will open his court immediately after the Grand Jury has been charged. It is not certain whether or not Circuit Judge Allen B. Endicott will be present on the opening day of the term, as he will not hear cases in the Civil Court until October 25. Should he not be present, Justice Trenchard will make the trial call of the civil cases.

Three homicide cases are listed for the investigation of the Grand Jury. One of the defendants is a young woman, colored, Mamie Lockhart, who fatally shot her husband John B. last, at Atlantic City. The others are Antonio La Verda and Augustus Lutherman, the first charged for the murder of Stephen Perina, and the second for killing John Kneener, an aged veteran, May 24 last, at Atlantic City.

The jury will be called upon to investigate the sensational "tar and feather" affair at McKee City, in which three farmers, Charles Quinn, Joseph Vaughn and Thomas Stratton, all held under heavy bail, are charged with atrocious assault and battery on Frank Smith, a Gilbert shopkeeper, in the resort. Among the persons who shot at his housekeeper, Kate Daley, will be called to answer to a charge of atrocious assault with intent to kill.

There are a number of "white slave" cases for the jury to consider, the police authorities of Atlantic City being determined to root out this deplorable practice in the resort. Among those held to answer to the charges are: Samuel Nelson, Edwin Nowlan, William Thomas, James Mulhern and John Reisman.

A large supply of English pheasants, which were released in the woods in several localities last Fall, have propagated well and will in time afford abundant sport for gunners. Some of the hunters suggest that there should be no slaughter of the pheasants this year, in order to give them another year in which to increase and fully stock the County.

Rabbit and quail are also reported plentiful in almost every hunting district. Large coveys of quail have been seen along the County roads and on the farms.

FREEDHOLDERS SELL BONDS

Authorise \$60,000 Issue For Improvement of Meadow Boulevard Bridges—Members Guests of Engineer Rightmire.

At a meeting of the County Board of Chosen Freeholders held Wednesday morning last at Memorial Hall, Atlantic City, the balance of the bonds for improvements to the County buildings, amounting in all to \$60,000, were disposed of at a premium. Four bonds, at \$5,000 each, were purchased by the Egg Harbor Commercial Bank at the September meeting. Four more were sold Wednesday to the same bank, the balance going to the Atlantic Safe Deposit and Trust Company, of Atlantic City. The bonds were taken at a small premium, at five per cent. Five bids were received in all, but it was the opinion of the Finance Committee and County Solicitor that the offers of the two purchasing banks were the best.

Bids for repairs to bridges on the County Boulevard were received at the meeting, the contract for all four improvements going to the Nelson Meredith Company, which underbid all others. The bids on the bridge work were in full as follows:

D. C. Murland—Little Hay, \$13,400; Beach Thoroughfare, \$12,500; Fish Creek, \$19,200; Jonathan's Thoroughfare, \$13,200.
A communication was read by Fred. Schuchardt from the Bozarth Lumber Company asking to be released from a bid to supply the County with lumber for \$50,000. A motion to release the company was carried.

A bond issue of \$60,000 for the improvements to be made to the County bridges was carried by a vote of 22 to 1, Freeholder Anderson Bourgeois dissenting. Twelve bonds will be issued, each for \$5,000. Following a report on the bids for the work the contract was awarded by the Nelson Meredith Company as above, by a vote of 21 to 2, Freeholders Black and Bourgeois voting in the negative.

Following the report of Chairman Robinson of the Road Committee, the Board gave the Committee power to negotiate for the purchase of lands on the Chestnut Neck Road in order to eliminate several dangerous curves. Freeholder Bourgeois raised the question whether the Board could delegate such power to the Committee and Solicitor E. A. Higbee answered in the affirmative, explaining that the Committee could not very well go against the wishes of the Board.

Freeholder John S. Risley, of Hamilton Township, made a motion that the Board communicate with Commissioner Fred Gilkyson relative to voiding the contract of Hilpott for the building the May's Landing-Tuckahoe road, on the contractor's request. The motion was unanimously carried. County Collector Levi C. Albertson was granted a leave of absence for three weeks. Mr. Albertson will spend a vacation in the mountains of Pennsylvania.

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RINGING RESOLUTIONS.

Second Congressional District Republican Platform.

We, the delegates assembled, in the Republican Congressional Convention of the Second District, of the State of New Jersey, are proud of the party achievements in National and State affairs, and promise every effort for still greater accomplishments for the good of all the people.

We ask all who believe in the policies of President Taft regardless of party affiliations, to unite with us in the support of a Republican Congress, to the end that the people's work, conducted so successfully under his administration, may be continued and extended until all wrongs of special privilege have been corrected, and the enactment of new laws for the protection, wise use and conservation of National resources in accord with the policies of Presidents Roosevelt and Taft.

We commend to the consideration of the people the splendid administration of William H. Taft. We point triumphantly to the results he has already achieved in his twenty months of office and during a single legislative year he has accomplished more (in conformity with his party platform promises) of great moment to the Nation than perhaps any previous administration in our history.

The tariff has been revised in accordance with the Republican doctrine of protecting home industries and American labor. The revision did not raise the rate of duty on a single article of domestic consumption. The increases made were on luxuries and articles not of ordinary use. We believe that industrial accidents to workmen should be treated as a public calamity. Industrial operations and the compensation thereof as part of the cost of production. We are persuaded that the experience of other countries demonstrates that this principle can be applied to our industrial condition without increasing the burdens of industry.

The Republican party through Congress and the President has shown its progressiveness in promoting navigable inland waterways, and in this connection we most earnestly commend the action of the Governor and the Legislature of New Jersey in supplementing these National waterways improvements with the great work which is being accomplished on the inland waterways of our State.

This convention endorses the Governor and the Legislature of New Jersey for the liberal State aid received in the extension of good roads through the counties of the Second Congressional District.

We heartily endorse Mr. Gardner's efforts to secure the State privilege of maternal and labor publications, to make private made goods subject to the laws of the State where offered for sale, to prevent the purchase of such goods for the public use, and his earnest co-operation with the President in securing the establishment of Postal Savings Banks, and especially that feature, peculiarly his own, which authorizes the issue of 2 1/2 bond denominations from 20 to 100 dollars so that the national debt may be held by the people of small means.
