The Constitution of the State of New Jersey, egulating the exercise of State authority, in Article 1, Section 9, provides: 🌼 No person shall be held to answer for a criminal offence unless on the presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases of impeachment or in cases cognizable by justices of the peace, or arising in the army of navy or in the militia, when in

actual service in time of war or public

danger. Without conceding precedence to any one in New Jersey over Dr. Wilson in scholarly familiarity with these two instruments, we cannot repress a feeling of curiosity concerning his harmonizing of his own words with the sections which we have quoted. It is quite obvious that the offences which we had in mind as demanding punishment were not such as were to be dealt with by impeachment or by a justice of the peace, or such as had. arisen in the military services. Indeed, a conspirmey against the laws of the United States might well be regarded as an infamous crime. It is difficult to escape the conclusion, therefore, that Dr. Wilson would have persons held to answer for serious criminal offences without presentment or indictment by a grand jury, contrary to the explicit provisions of the Constitution of the State of New Jersey and the United States of America. We should add that thus to empower a prosecuting attorney, who is often an intense partisan, to arrogate to himself the functions of a grand jury and to place under indictment at his personal discretion and pleasure any captives of his individual dragnet would be a revival of the lettre de cachet system to which the citizens of


