The weather was not ideal, but in spite of the cold wind and occasional showers, gunners invaded woods and fields in search of their favorite game. Most of them were successful and returned at dusk with fairly well filled game-bag.

That game is more abundant throughout

this part of the State is everywhere evident, although it is not nearly so plentiful as the numers would like to see it; but sportsmen say the policies of the State Fish and Game Commission in protecting the game and propagating it for distribution is doing much to preserve the sport in New Jersey.

The sentiment of the sportsmen is clearly against trapping and they will give the authorities their support in detecting and punishing those who violate the game law in this respect. The complaints are not against those who trap on their own land, but against that class of persons who under the pretense of hunting with a gun on their shoulder covertly spare the game and destroy the sport of hunters! who gun in a legitimate manner.

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



Few changes in the seasons for game are Due from U.S. Treasurer noted in the neat little pamphlet of New Jersey Fish and Game Laws that is being distributed among sportsmen. The open seasons Quail, partridge, grouse. English or ring- Capital stock paid in\$100,000.00 Trustee. necked pheasant, squirrel, rabbit, wild turkey and woodcock, November 15 to December 31.
