Frequent collisions have occurred, but fortunately there has been no serious mishap.

Both Freeholder George B. Jeffers, of Egg Harbor Township, and the Hamilton Townshitp representative will do all in their power to secure the new road during the coming year and they will have strong support.

FEDERAL COURTS TO DECIDE. Elisar Question Bone of Contention Among Legal Circles.

Under the dissenting opinion of Justice Garrison, of the Court of Errors and Appeals, filed in the Zellef case last week it is believed that application will be made to the United States Court for a writ of habeas corpus, raising as an independent action the right of the justices to name clisors to draw grand juries.

Justice Garrison holds that clisors are known to the common law only as men already in the service of the court as officers this season. before the ineligibility of the Sheriff or the coroners has been shown, and that ellsors must be drawn from such court officers, and not from the common run of elligens as was done both in Atlantic City and in Hudson County.

The case can not be taken to-the United Bintes Court now as a matter of review, but could be taken there on a writ of habeas corpus, and only then after Zeller had been arrested and is in custody, and it is believed that this will be the next move to this cause,


