Atlantic County. The State board of equalization of taxes made its annual report to J. Franklin Fort on Tuesday showing that the net valuation of real and personal property assessed for local taxation in this State is \$2,045,808,213.85, of which \$1,776,408,029.50 is real estate and \$271,-

941,267.93 personal property. The total amount of property exempt from taxation in the State is \$172,975,158 which is divided as follows: Public school property, \$33,462,780; other school property, \$9,476,685; public property, \$65,006,926, church and charitable property. \$57,281,580; cemeteries and

graveyards, \$7,747,207. In Atlantic County there is a net increase of \$7,181,169; real estate has increased \$7,400,101, but personal property has decreased by \$239,682 since last year. About \$5,000,000 of the real estate increase comes from Atlantic City. The decrease is due to the shrinkage in the assessable value of bank stock. 
