The Cause of Epidemic Diseases

In the *Medical Union*, a homoeopathic monthly journal, the first number of which has just appeared, is an article by Dr. Guernsey, one of the editors, on epidemic cerebro-spinal meningitis—a disease with a long name, which of late has been very rapid in its course and very fatal in many places. In the course of the article, Dr. Guernsey refers to a curious theory, lately set forth by a physician residing in Mexico, by way of accounting for the origin and prevalence of epidemics, in which the old notion of planetary influences reappears, modified and rendered plausible by being brought into connection with modern science. It is evident, however, that the theory, if it have any ground, ought not to be adopted until after the observation of years has shown a regular coincidence of the supposed cause with the known effect. The following is the passage referred to:

"Dr. Knapp, of Mexico, has recently brought forward the theory that the periodical increase of planetary attraction, which occurs when the superior planets make their perihelion circuits, is the cause direct and indirect of the inauguration of epidemics, or recurrence of the so-called pestilential periods."

"He writes, 'if the sun and moon disturb earth, ocean and atmosphere, by their force of attraction, elevating immense tidal waves thereon, with increase of gravity in the atmosphere appreciable by the barometer, and if the mass of Jupiter is by far the most influential element in the planetary system after that of the sun, and Saturn the next, surely Jupiter's and Saturn's periodical approaches in making their perihelion circuits must affect the earth and the organized existences on its surface to a considerable extent or degree, by their increased attraction of gravitation and disturbance of its atmosphere, and the natural vital stimulents of all organized life.'

"The blights in vegetation, which invariably precede and accompany epidemics, he attributes to the derangement of the usual supply of the stimulus furnished by gravity, and asserts that the pestilential periods are always coincident with the perihelion of the large superior planets, especially of Jupiter and Saturn."

"According to his illustrations, the gravity of the first epidemic coincided with the perihelion of Jupiter in 1809; that of the second, with the commensurate perihelion of Jupiter and Saturn, which coincided also with the shipwreck epidemic of the Irish famine years, from 1845 to 1849, when they culminated in cholera. Our last epidemic would have coincided with the perihelion passage of Jupiter in 1868, and as he is about six years in making his perihelion circuit, his influence would be distributed over that time."

Thus far Dr. Guernsey. There seems to be periods when, although no epidemic diseases prevail, the hold which old persons and persons in delicate health have on life seems to be weakened and is easily ruptured. The present is apparently such a period. The number of deaths of persons of note, who have passed the middle age of life, or who have labored under some infirmity not always incompatible with longevity is extraordinarily great. Within a few weeks past almost every daily newspaper has announced the departure of some person of more than common prominence in public life.—*N. J. M. Post.*

A HINT ON HYACINTH CULTURE.

—A correspondent of the *Country Gentleman* gives the following account of an experiment, which the *English Garden* commends as worthy of a trial:—

"I procured a large, coarse sponge, such as coachmen use in washing carriages, and making a number of incisions about 3 inches deep and 2 long, with a sharp knife, in the top, I inserted the bulbs in the openings, which, in consequence of the elastic nature of the sponge, closed over them, permitting only the points to appear above the surface. They were arranged in two concentric circles around a fine large fellow in the centre, numbering fifteen in all. I then placed the whole thing in the top of a large vase, capable of holding nearly two gallons, and filled the vase by pouring water through the sponge until about one-half of the sponge was below the surface of the water, and the other part above. The water was slightly warmed, so as to produce a bottom heat; so very necessary in striking cuttings and otherwise forcing vegetation; and being kept in a warm room, it was not allowed to become cold. In two or three days the bulbs began to shoot their bright green spirals upward, giving promise of success, and in two or three weeks they were 5 or 6 inches high. About this time, in

order to hide the unsightly appearance of the sponge, I scattered a few thimblefuls of rape seed over the surface, between the bulbs, which sprang up almost immediately, and covered it entirely with a fine moss-like mantle, adding greatly to the beauty of the experiment."

Desiring to extend the knowledge and usefulness of the discovery and the enjoyment of its beauty, I now had it taken to my store in town, where it soon became an object of interest to great numbers of ladies, who watched its progress almost daily, until the bright flowers, more radiant than Solomon in all his glory, unfolded their shining petals, filling the air with fragrance, and astonishing every one with their unusually large size and perfect forms. The experiment was pronounced a complete success."

SALT FOR PEAR TREES.

—Salting round pear trees to prevent the blight is becoming a general practice in Central New York. From 400 to 600 pounds to the acre are regularly applied each year, with satisfactory results. A correspondent of *The Small Fruit Recorder* writes as follows on this subject: "Last spring I put a small shovelful of the refuse material from the salt works—which is composed, I believe, of salt, lime, and ash—around a four-year-old pear tree. It has made a very thrifty growth, and the leaves are all free from blight or spot, and have a very glossy, healthy look; while others of the same lot, manured with barnyard manure, have grown but little, and the foliage is spotted and curled. Now, if no ill effect may be attributed to the barnyard manure, it would seem that the difference in these trees was owing to the salt."

WHAT AN ENGLISH GROOM SAID TO A YANKEE HOSTLER.

When a horse comes in all wet with perspiration, you let him stand in the stable and dry with all the dirt on. In England, we take the horse as he comes in from a drive and sprinkle blood-warm water all over him from his head to his feet. Then we scrape him down and blanket him, rubbing his legs and feet dry. Thus, in an hour, he is clean and dry, and ready to take a good feed, while with your way he will stand and swelter for hours, and finally dry sticky and dirty. Our horses never founder and never take cold. We never use a curry-comb. You scratch your horses too hard. The only care necessary is to have the water not very cold, then bathe them instantly, while you are rubbing their legs."





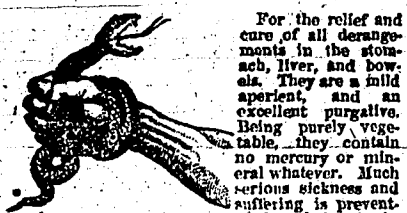

DIRECTIONS.

FOR MAKING MUSH with No. 1, GROUND COARSE—Mix four table-spoonful of the Wheat with a gill of cold water; rub into a smooth paste; then pour it into a pint of boiling water, stirring briskly; boil for 20 minutes. To be eaten with rich cream.

FOR PUDDINGS, &c., USE No. 2, GROUND FINE.—Mix a table-spoonful of the Food with a small quantity of cold water; rub to a smooth paste; add to one-half pint of boiling water, constantly stirring, and boil about 8 minutes over a moderate fire. Add milk and flavor to taste. For bread, use as ordinary flour.

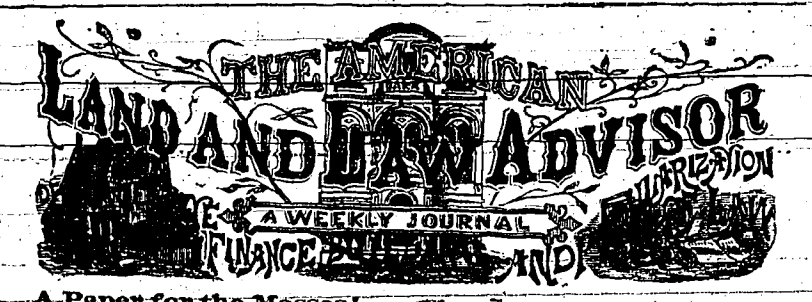

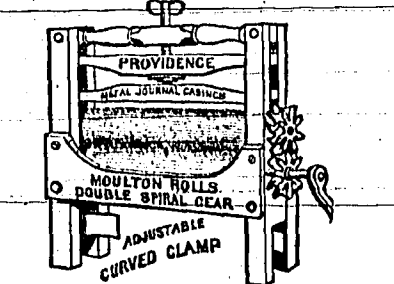
