LOCAL MISCELLANY.

The crop of Irish Potatoes is abundant. Election day is the 4th of November, one week from next Tuesday.

The Fishback puddle and rail mills, at Pottsville, Pa., have suspended work. Six hundred heads are thrown out of employment.

The Melbourne Argus announces that the spring show of a horticultural society will be held on the 8th of November. So much for living at the antipodes.

The Supreme Court of Indiana, on Tuesday, rendered a decision confirming the constitutionality of the liquor law of that state, providing for civil damages.

The Democrats of Ohio have elected their Governor and have obtained control of the legislature, and of course will secure the next U. S. Senator, Mr. Thurman.

Gov. Straw, of N. H., who was one of the judges of the baby show at the State fair last week, was surprised on Saturday evening by finding an infant two months old on his door-step.

The storm of Monday was a destructive one in parts of the country. Great damage was done on the lakes; rivers were raised to overflowing and great loss of property caused thereby.

The State Council of Penna., O. U. A. M., held its session in Philadelphia on Tuesday; 200 subordinate councils were represented at the meeting. There are now 327 Councils in the State. Total membership 42,351; receipts during year, \$163,753.54; relief, \$63,080.23; in treasury, \$283,938.23; widows and orphans fund, \$40,588.91.

The product of the Philadelphia Mint will, this month, be \$10,000,000 of gold. Since the beginning of the panic the demand for the coinage of gold bullion has been unprecedented, and the Mint has temporarily abandoned the coinage of silver, which will, however, be resumed as soon as possible.

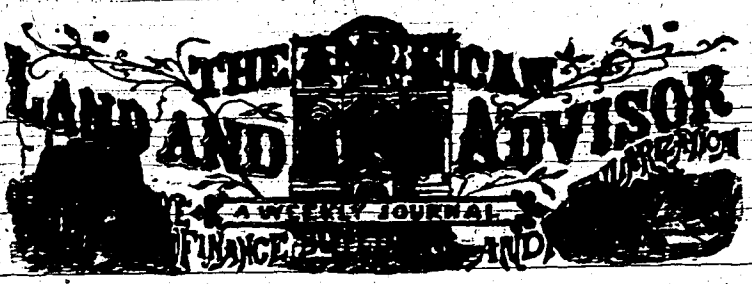
