# The Furrow

News and Views About the Farm

### GRAIN BELT STRIKE

While not favoring a grain "strike" or any sort of boycott among organized farmers in the great agricultural States of the middle west, the furrow is strongly in favor of holding back grain as an argument for better prices, as a means to attract attention to the Illinois Agricultural Association. Reports were received by secretaries of State Farm Bureau Federations in Missouri, Minnesota, South Dakota, Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, Wisconsin and Kentucky. In no case did a State Federation report it had advised a "strike."

### STATE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE NOTES

Remove all cedar trees from the vicinity of the apple trees so that there will be no more damage from the cedar rust on the fruit trees. One quarter mile is the shortest distance advisable between cedar trees and apple trees.

Black knot can be controlled only by cutting out all infected wood—cut back to good, healthy wood and burn all prunings.

### LIME-SULPHUR WASH FREZING INJURED BY FREEZING

One can never tell just what the effect of freezing will have upon concentrated lime sulphur wash. Sometimes it is not injured in the least by freezing, and at other times it is differently spoiled. Samples from different orchards have been taken, in different parts of the State, and returned to temperatures above freezing by the presence of its lime sulphur wash. It is always best to stir lime sulphur wash where it will not freeze.

### INDIAN MEAL (MOTHA)

The Indian Meal Moth (Plodia interpunctella) is a common household pest, the larvae of which are found in flour, grain of all kinds, etc., etc. It is always best to stir lime sulphur wash where it will not freeze.

### WASH AGAINST DANGER OF HOOD AND MOUTH DISEASE

The Bureau of Animal Industry, Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, is urging farmers to wash their hands, faces and clothing with disinfectant before and after handling livestock to prevent the spread of disease.

### PRUNING GRAPE VINES

Pruning grape vines should be done in early spring, before the buds start to swell. The prunings should be burned to prevent the spread of disease.

### CHRISTMAS CANDLES IN THE WINDOW

Christmas candles in the window are a beautiful sight, but should be used with caution. They should be placed in a safe place and not left unattended.

### NIGHT GOWNS

Night gowns should be made of soft, comfortable material. They should be well-fitting and have a comfortable collar.

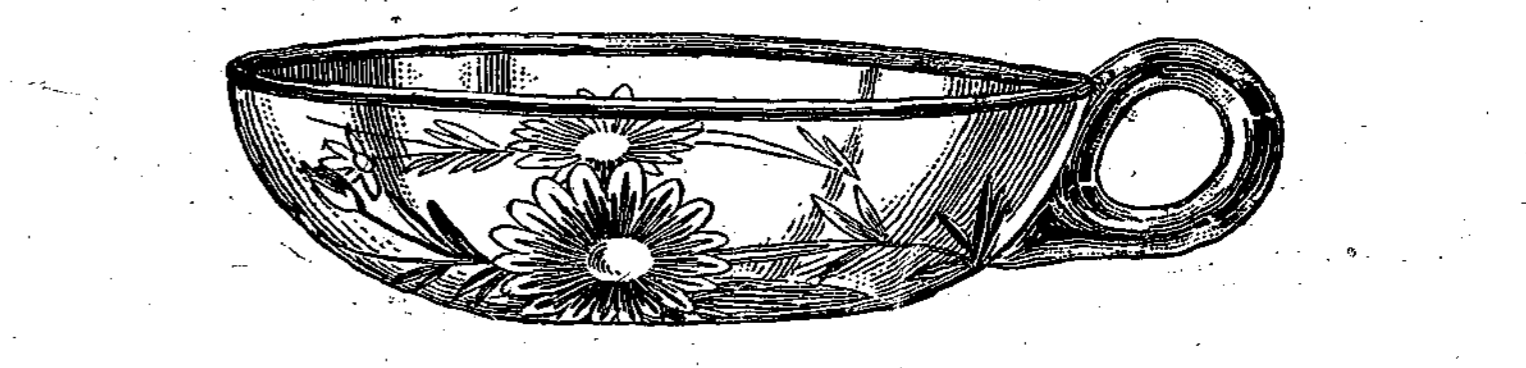

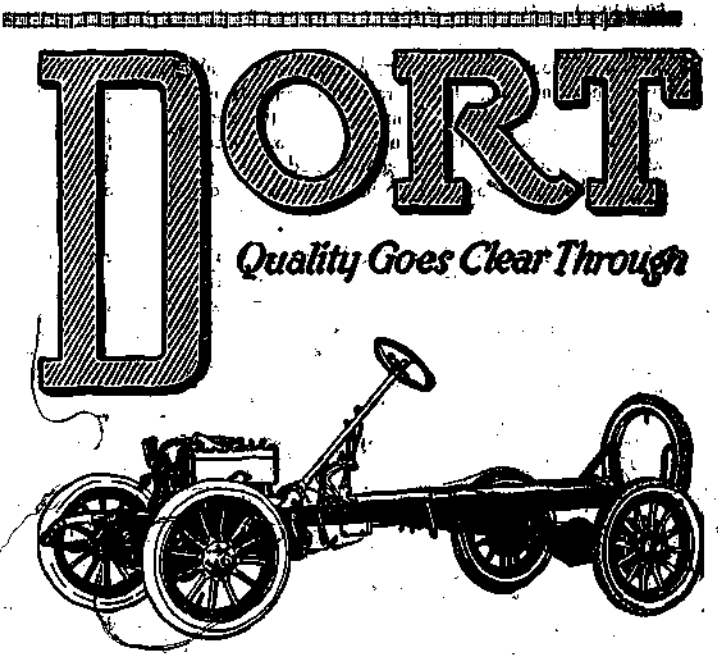

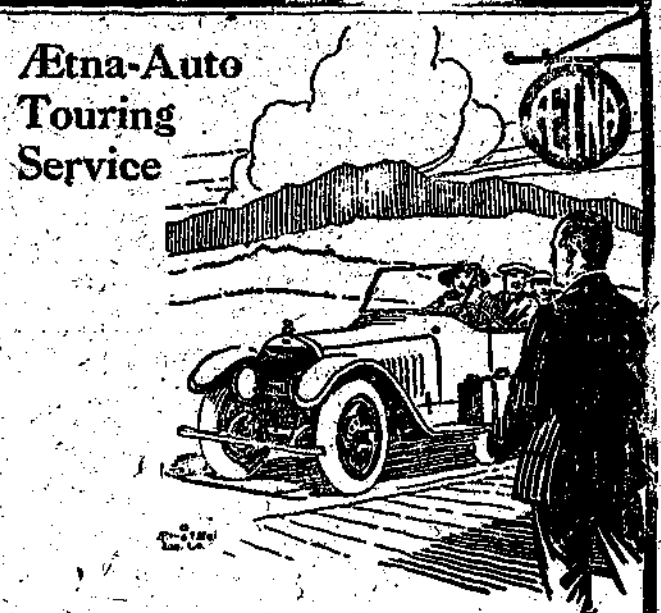
