Good resolutions made upon the New Year are just like so much pie crust, they are very easily broken, unless you make a firmer resolution than all the others—and that is a resolve to keep them. There is but one safe way to lay out those resolutions and that is to look back over the years that have gone, single out mistakes that have been made, and then resolve not to make the same mistakes again.

People were surprised on receiving their water bills this week, at the unusually large amounts asked for; but when they read the explanation, they were relieved. The department has changed to semi-annual payments from quarterly.

Chamber of Commerce—Successful Year.

On January 6th, 1920, the Chamber appointed a committee, C. I. Littlefield Chairman, to collect monies for the purpose of erecting the Memorial Monument. This committee collected \$372.50 for this purpose, and this monument was erected in School Park, and dedicated on May 30th, 1921. The cost of monument, markers and other expenses connected with the same was \$365.00, leaving \$87.50 balance, which was turned over to the Chamber to be used for future expenses on said monument.

March 2nd, 1920, Chamber petitioned the Freeholders to pave Egg Harbor Road. Through the efforts of the Chamber, and our local Freeholders, this road was paved during 1921, and formally opened by the Chamber on December 6th, 1921.

April 6th, 1920, Government discontinued Amato bus line. It was taken up by the Chamber and money collected by the Chamber, from Hammonton merchants to cover expense of same. Result being that residents of Amato continued to come to Hammonton to purchase merchandise.

September 3rd, 1920, endeavored to have Town purchase Verner property for Town Hall purposes.

General Election of 1920, Chamber canvassed Hammonton voters with "Vote for the bridge" slogan with excellent results.

January 4th, 1921, Chamber petitioned Town Council to have houses numbered, and street signs erected. During January Council appropriated \$700 for this purpose.

March 4th, 1921, Chamber Annual Dinner was a great success.

May 30th, 1921, Dedicated monument.

September 26th, 1921, succeeded in having Penny express to Camden stop at Hammonton 7:31 a. m.

October 25th, 1921, Succeeded in having Penny express from Camden stop at Hammonton at 5:30 p. m.

October 6th, 1921, Succeeded in having Reading express from Camden stop at Hammonton 1:42 p. m. Saturdays.

This stopping of these trains is a great convenience to the people of Hammonton.

October 4th, 1921, Chamber appointed a committee to co-operate with Town Council in matter of widening Bellevue Ave. This work is progressing very nicely, and it is expected that Bellevue Avenue will be widened 4 feet on each side, between Egg Harbor Road and Third Street, during 1922.

October 31st, 1921, Halloween Celebration successfully put over by the Chamber, there being more in line than ever before.

October 4th, 1921, The base ball game between the Chamber and the regular Hammonton team, and the preliminary practice for the same was for the direct purpose of advertising the weekly Hammonton ball games, create an interest in the same, swell the attendance and thereby the receipts. The success of this venture was proven by the immediate increase in attendance, which enabled our home team to stage a better class of games than formerly for the balance of the season.

December 21st, 1921, Officers of the Consolidated Theaters Corporation of Philadelphia, appeared by request before the Chamber's Executive Committee for the purpose of explaining to the Chamber just what their intentions were in the matter of their proposed building of a theatre in Hammonton. The findings at this meeting, and the immediate action taken by the Chamber, has no doubt saved the possible investors of Hammonton a great many thousands of dollars.

A Pleasant Reception.

The workers' reports totalled a membership of 507, with receipts of \$507. This is the largest membership ever attained in Hammonton.
