Town Council met on Wednesday morning, and received the report of the sewer commission, among the items of business. They will meet again next Wednesday, to consider the budget.

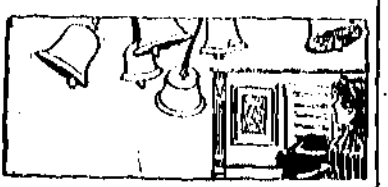

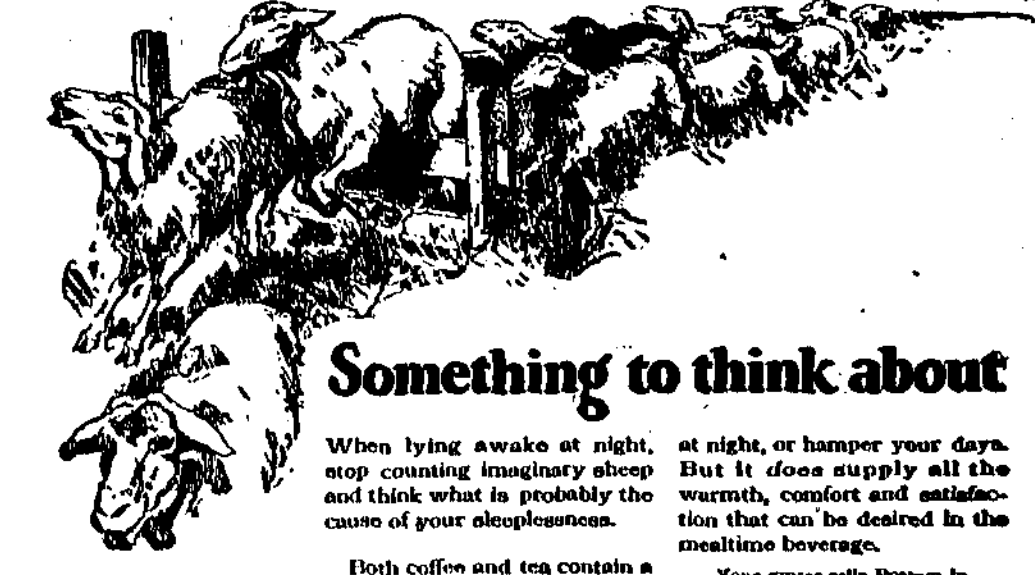

Annual School Meeting Notes.

Date of meeting, second Tuesday in February, February 13, 1923.

Candidates for Members of Board of Education must be nominated by petition similar to petition for a Primary Election; no petition however shall contain more than one name as a candidate.

Ballots must be addressed to and filed with the District Clerk at least five days before the date of the Annual Meeting.

Appropriations and public questions to be voted on by the legal voter appear on the same ballot with candidates, the same method of voting or marking as on General Election Ballot for voting on public questions is to be observed at the Annual School Elections.

Who May Vote—Section 12 of Chapter 211 P. L. 1922 says: "No person shall be permitted to vote at such school election unless his or her name appears (on Poll Books) as having voted at the preceding General Election."

The Attorney-General has before construed that Section 12, if literally interpreted, would be unconstitutional.

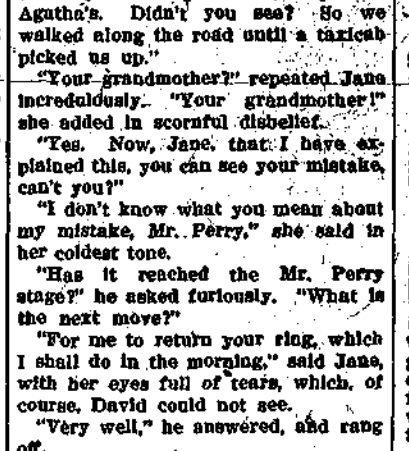
