Town Council meets next Wednesday evening. They will bring up the tax ordinance budget for second reading.

Mrs. Henry Miller, mother of Mrs. Chris Mithl, died on Saturday last at her home at Elm. The funeral will be held to-day.

Miss Alice Saunders has suffered a nervous break-down, and is receiving hospital treatment. Her mother is also seriously ill.

As a result of American Education Week combined with New Jersey Visit-the-Schools Week, December 4 to 10, it is gratifying to report that records from forty-one schools and districts reporting show 1,726 adults visited the schools of Atlantic County. The largest attendance was recorded in the Hammonton district, namely 500; the next largest, Egg Harbor City, 314; Ventnor City, 300; Mays Landing, 299. Number of one-room schools not reporting, 5; number of two-room schools not reporting, 3; number of five or more schools not reporting, 3. All together, records show that there were present as visitors in the schools of the County, excluding those schools from which no returns have been received, 1,725 persons.

School Percentages.

For the fourth consecutive month in the rivalry for first place among the leaders in school attendance of Atlantic County Buena Vista Township maintains its first place for December with a per centage of attendance of 95.9. Somers Point continues in second place with 94.4 per cent, Hamilton Township moves up to third place with 93.3 per cent and Egg Harbor City ranks fourth with 89.7 per cent. Egg Harbor City explains that its loss in rank is due to illness among children. No school in the County so far as the County Superintendent's records show reports a 100 per cent attendance for December. The highest per cent reported is 99.4 per cent which was attained by the primary room in the Wheat Road School, Buena Vista Township.

Supervising Principal Phillips reports that his record for the year to date is 97.05 per cent. This is a splendid attainment, considering that there are enrolled in these rural district schools 1,066 children.

Each character, from Polly, Gertrude, Mayme, Betty, Aunt Hetty and Mrs. Higglepiggle and Bert, Dick, Rich, Steve, Jack, Daniel Easton, and last but not least, Inspector Clancey, fulfilled every expectation. There was fun, plot and love from start to finish.

Greenmount Cemetery Association is spending a considerable amount of money and effort in beautifying the grounds and the improvement committee will appreciate every effort of lot holders and others to co-operate with them in making this one of the best appearing cemeteries in South Jersey. The committee would call attention to jitney drivers and truck owners that the roads through the Cemetery were not built for heavy traffic, and would like drivers to be instructed not to use the Cemetery roads as public thoroughfares. Income Tax Information

Forms 1040-A, revised and simplified, for filing individual returns of income for the calendar year of 1921 of \$5000 and less were available Wednesday, January 18th, at the office of Collector of Internal Revenue, R. L. Sturge, and branch office at Trenton, N. J.

On page 1, under the heading of "Income," are spaces for reporting the following items: salaries, wages, commissions, etc., income from partnerships, fiduciaries, etc., rents and royalties; profit (or loss) from business or profession; profit (or loss) from sale of real estate; profit (or loss) from sale of stocks, bonds, etc., and other income.

Under each of the above conditions, a report must be filed even though no tax is due. The exemptions are \$1000 for single persons and married persons not living with husband or wife, \$2000 for married persons living with husband or wife whose net income for 1921 was \$5000 or less, and \$3000 for such persons whose net income was more than \$5000.

The normal tax rates are unchanged, 4 per cent on the first \$5000 of net income above the exemption and 3 per cent on the remaining net income. The tax this year, like last, may be paid in full at the time of filing the return, or in four equal installments, due on or before March 15, June 15, September 15, and December 15.

Heavy penalties are provided by the new revenue act for failure to file a return and pay the tax on time. Announcement will be made through the press of the date of release of forms 1040 for filing individual return of income of more than \$5000.

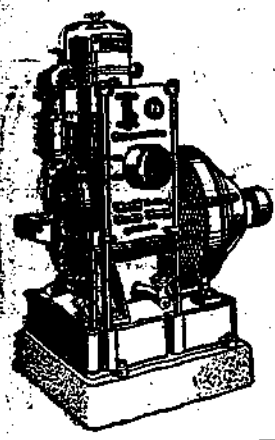

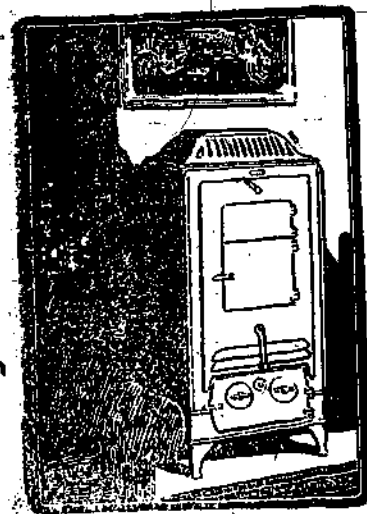
