Views of the Farm Bureau.

"Has the Farm Bureau Federation really done anything for me?" each member might have asked, as he neared the close of his first year's membership. "Have I received anything in return for the money I have put into it? Has the investment paid me anything?"

Returns cannot always be expected in such an association. Nor can returns of this sort always be measured by dollars and cents. But that New Jersey farmers are seeing their problems clearly and that their organization is making progress in solving them is evident from the Federation's accomplishments listed below by Dr. App. 'It is a record of which our farmers may well be proud."

1. Called a conference of all the farm organizations of New Jersey to meet with the railroad officials and obtained reduction in freight rates on manure and lime which will save the farmer \$1.00 to \$1.50 per acre.

2. Assisted in the passage of the state rural police bill. 3. Assisted in defeating the daylight-saving law. 4. Prepared and conducted a hearing on the filled milk bill, passed by the Legislature, but not signed by the Governor.

5. Assisted in getting an emergency appropriation of \$50,000 for tuberculosis control in cattle. 6. In co-operation with the Grange and conference with representatives of all farm organizations prepared a definite legislative program showing the agricultural culture of the various farm organizations by both political parties in their platforms.

7. Prepared a definite plan for the development of rural schools which met with the friendly consideration of the State Commissioner of Education. 8. Met with representatives of the State Highway Commission and supported the selection of the bridge site between Camden and Philadelphia.

9. Supported the national legislative program by informing the United States Senators and Congressmen of the needs of New Jersey farmers, in opposition to the tariff on eggs, dairy products, potatoes and fruit.

10. Offered for the purchase of the Muncie Shovel plant, which will give the farmers a voice in the manufacture of fertilizers.

11. Conferred with representatives of the Philadelphia United Bridge Commission and supported the selection of the bridge site between Camden and Philadelphia.

12. Met with representatives of the State Chamber of Commerce and secured their cooperation in advancing the farmers' interests.

BANDIT GIVES LIFE FOR LOVE

Notorious Mexican Desperado Lured to His Death by Native Beauty.

LAST OUTLAW CHIEF Pedro Zamora, Whose Band Captured Girls and Carried Them Off, is Dead, an Amateur Model Secret of Love.

Mexico City.—Pedro Zamora, the last of the leading bandits in Mexico, was lured to his death by a woman he had made captive, according to authentic sources. Pedro Zamora, who made bandit love to the women of the state and who was probably the most daring and picturesque bandit who ever added a town south of the Rio Grande, Zamora and his band were originally vagabonds, or cowboys, on one of the great ranches in the state of Jalisco.

Several years ago a favorable offer was made to any one who would kill Zamora and his band and bring their heads into a police district in the state, and Pedro and his brother gave up their ranch jobs and became pack trail riders. 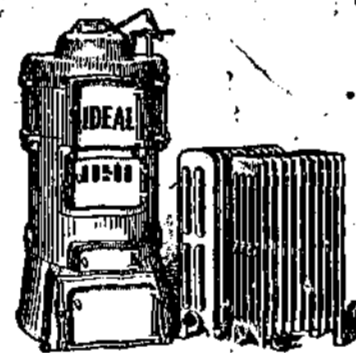

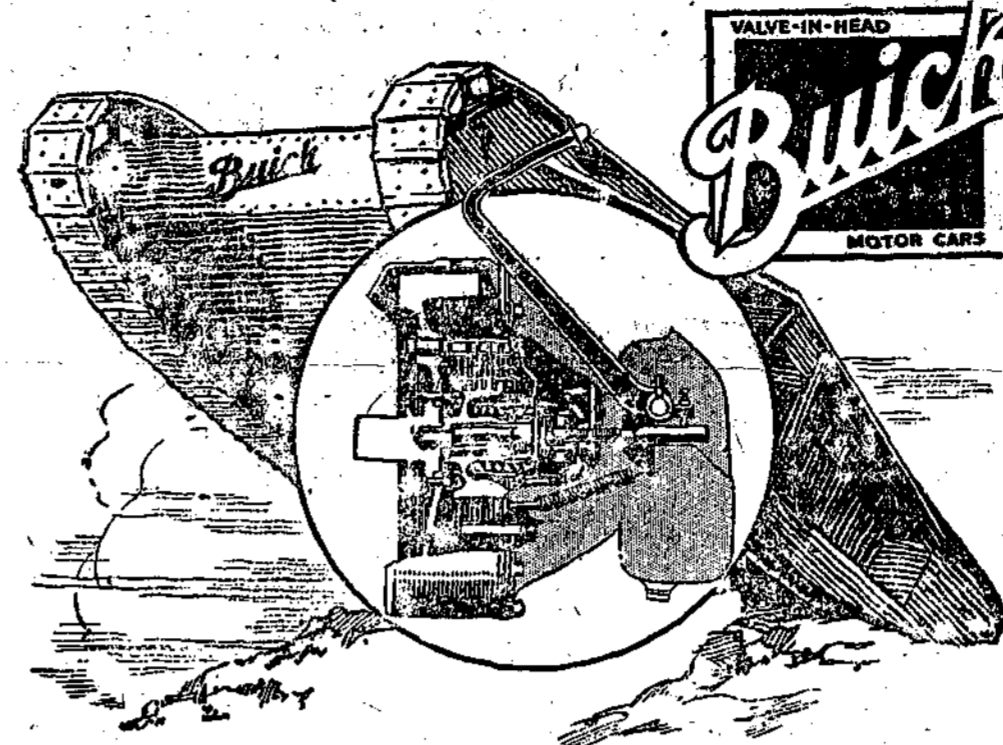
