The Next Town Council.

MR. EDITOR: The coming Town
election will be a very important one.
There are thirteen offices to be filled.
Having been a member of Council for
three years, I fully understand the
importance of electing only good men,
and it behooves our citizens to attend
the town caucus and nominate such
men as we know are above reproach,
and have a clean record, and mentally
competent to transact town business;
for the coming year will mean a busi-
ness year to the Council.

There are three water commissioners
to appoint, and the water business
will involve much time and thought.
A new telephone company is asking a
franchise; and also a trolley company.
The Pennsylvania Railroad will likely
take steps to bridge or sink their road
through town, which means much to
our business men. These matters are
only a few that will come up before
the next Council. Our town is grow-
ing fast, and with the growth, of
course, come up vital matters that
need keen foresight and intelligence
to act on. We are no more a mere
village, with two trains a day to the
city, and every one knowing each
other, but have a population of nearly
five thousand, and a large number of
trains daily, each way, with many
strangers inquiring for homes, with
improvements on every side. With a
Council of intelligent, business-like
men, the town can be made to boom.
We are a progressive people, and be-
lieve in progress, and with our new
water-works we need not take a rear
stand among towns; and with our
renovated electric light plant, we
ought to make a growth that will open
the eyes of some of our less progressive
citizens, and advertise the town as a
desirable place to live in. Now every-
thing depends upon the Council to
bring all this about, for a Councilman
ought to be a fearless man, and one
who will take a decided stand for law
and order and good government.
