Report of Recording Secretary of The
Woman's Civic Club of Hammonton,
N. J., for the year ending March 2, 1909:

Sixteen meetings were held during
the year, twelve regular and four
special. Average attendance, 25. The
maximum attendance was May 5th,
forty-seven members present. The min-
imum attendance was January 5, eleven
present. Average attendance of offi-
cers, 37-16. There are seventy-five
charter members. Eighteen were re-
ceived during the year, and eleven
withdrew. Total membership, eighty-
two.

Six garbage cans have been placed in
the town, for the purpose of promoting
street cleanliness. A street sprinkler
was purchased and run very success-
fully during three summer months.
Five food sales were held, with success.

May 6, 1908, Mrs. Orville Bassett
presented the Club with a beautiful
hand carved gavel.

Socially, the Club has been most de-
lightfully entertained by Mrs. Meade,
Miss Bassett, Mrs. Spear, Miss Conkey,
Mrs. Prach, and Mrs. Rider.

November 5, 6, and 7, a fair and
entertainment was held, aggregating a
neat sum.

December 25, twenty-two needy fami-
lies of the town were given Christmas
cheer, and a box of toys sent to a

Reform home in Philadelphia, making
glad the hearts of many little inmates.

February 6, a concert was given for
the benefit of the Italian earthquake
sufferers.

Five trustees and one agent have been
elected. Trustees: Mrs. Henson, Mrs.
Loveland, Mrs. Chas. Smith, Mrs.
Spear, and Mrs. Monfort. Agent:
Mrs. A. J. Rider.

The Club has joined the Federation,
and has been legally incorporated. A
box in back has been rented for secur-
ing Club papers, etc.

March 2, 1909, Mr. Manley Austin
presented the Club with a ballot box.

A plea has been sent to Town Coun-
cil, requesting that sidewalks be cleared
of superfluous snow within twenty-four
hours from fall of same, street crossings
be cleaned of mud, and curbing of pave-
ments given proper attention.

A Club quartette is being organized
and an entertainment is in progress of
preparation.

A committee is engaged in procuring
a site for the erection of a Club house.

By keeping our chosen colors, red and
green, mingled with the stars and
stripes, and by living as loyally to our
motto in the future as we have during
the past year, we shall continue to
promote beauty, purity, cleanliness,
and goodness.

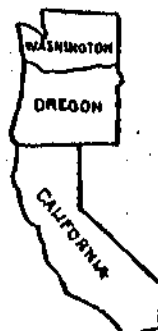

PRESIDENT TAFT.

On Thursday, March 4th, the inauguration of our new President, William H. Taft, and Vice-President James S. Sherman, took place at the National Capitol, this time in-doors, the first time for more than a decade. Although fair weather had been promised, an unexpected blizzard struck the East, stalling trains and cutting off Washington from the rest of the world, so that thousands did not reach the capital until the next day. Those who were there saw little but snow and slush and bedraggled fellow pedestrians. President Taft pledged himself to carry on the great work begun by our esteemed ex-President Roosevelt; and it is now up to the American people to stand by the Nation's choice, cut out unfriendly criticisms, and wait.

The Town Council.

It appears that Mr. Edward White has abandoned all thought of contest for the seat in Council to which we still believe he was elected. This leaves a vacancy, and Council is doing business with but five members, where the Charter requires six. Isn't it time that this vacancy was filled by the choice of some worthy man? Did it ever occur to you, reader, that next November will be an exceedingly important period in the Town's history? Whether Council fills the present vacancy, or not, there will be four Councilmen to elect, and a Mayor, virtually five members. Messrs. Baker and Dilger will be the only ones to hold over another year.

We sincerely hope that, for the good of the Town, five men of affairs, business men, representative men, will consent to serve during the next two years. There will be business to transact that will require ability of more than the average, and we need successful men, who have experience in management and in the expenditure of money.

The present Council is doing much very good work,—needed work,—with the aid of our efficient Clerk, and straightening out some things that had become badly tangled through oversight and neglect. All these, and more, will need attention,—that only just and legally correct ordinances be passed, and all unincorporated; that the public money be properly expended and accounted for; that streets be kept in good order, and every citizen's rights secured.

Yes, there are problems unnumbered to be solved, and no amateur should be entrusted with their solution. No race or party contains all the desirable qualifications, and must not expect to elect all from its ranks. Give us men without labels, with no partisan bias to serve, but with a sincere desire and determination to advance the interests of Hammononton, first, last, and all the time.
