



On opposite sides of the continent two water supply projects-the greatplan for the Catskill addition to New York's present system and that of Los Angeles for the utilization of the waters of the Owens river. Just as the limit of the apply of the metropolis is uncomfortably near the demand, on account of the wonderful growth of the city, so Los Angeles, which, instead of a population of 50,-000 in 1800, now has nearly 250,000. has difficulty to making ends meet, so far as water is concerned. So it is proposed to draw upon the Owene river valley and to bring its waters to the relief of the city.

No other water system to the world can compare with these two, and the omparisons and contrasts between them are of considerable interest. The Los Angeles supply must be carried 220 to the north of the city, to its doubl nation: the length of the new Catakill acqueduct will be 117 miles. The Owens river valley will yield 400,000,000 galtons dally; the Catekill reservoirs from-500.000.000 to 600.000.000 gallong. The esimated cost of the Pacific coast projset is \$25,000,000, that of the new Citis kHL system \$102,000,000.....
