Town Council.

Council held an adjourned meeting on Wednesday morning, with all present but Peter Tell.

Finance and Printing Committee reported that they did not favor the advance in Collector's salary asked for by the Water Commissioner. This was confirmed.

Same Committee recommended that Collector be reimbursed \$173 for fees turned over to the town by mistake.

John Machias made written complaint of foul language coming from the alley adjoining his restaurant; of crowds congregating and interfering with his business. Also that jitneys prevented parking in front of his place of business. Matter was left with Law and Order Committee, who will see that the place is quiet or action will be taken.

Ordinance funding the twelve thousand dollars temporary improvement notes for Bellevue Avenue paving, was passed second reading.

A resolution was adopted, confirming the report of the Sewer Assessment Committee.

At this point Peter Lucas addressed Council, and put himself on record as in favor of law and order and a united effort in that direction.

The long deferred petition from the Delaware and Atlantic Telephone and Telegraph Company, permitting them to lay conduits in town was read, and ordered spread on the minutes. The date for the hearing on the petition was fixed for March 28th, at nine o'clock, a. m.

Discussion then arose as to the recent gambling and booze notoriety given the town.

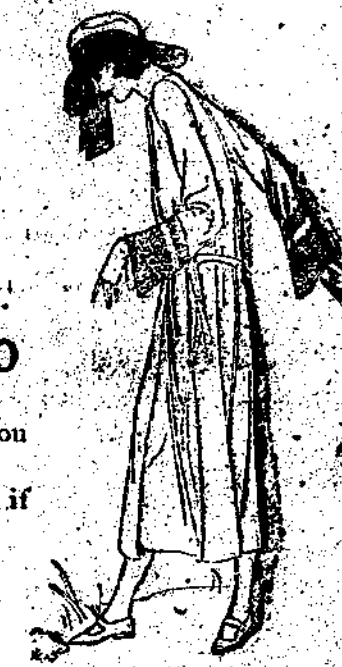

Visitors to Washington during the recess are invited to call at my office, where they will receive every courtesy and attention.

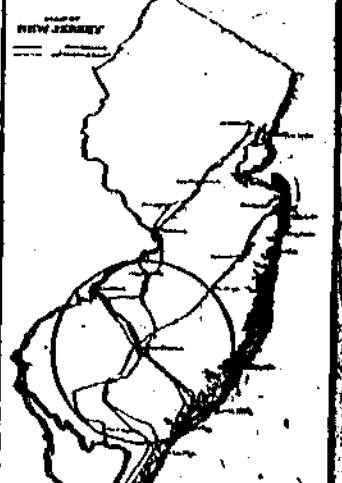

BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Council of the Town of Hammonton, that bonds of this Town, and in the denominations of one thousand dollars (\$1000.00), each shall be issued for TWELVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$12,000.00); and the same are hereby authorized and directed to be issued, for said sum, in payment of the contract for the improvement of Bellevue Avenue, from Third Street to Main Road, with concrete paving and gutters, the said improvement made in conjunction with the State Highway Department and Board of Chosen Freeholders of Atlantic County, and the Town of Hammonton, as provided under an Ordinance, entitled "An Ordinance for the Extraordinary Repair of Bellevue Avenue, by Paving and Gutting the same, from Third Street to Main Road, and providing for the approval of contracts with the Board of Chosen Freeholders of the County of Atlantic, whereby it shall bear a part of the cost of said improvement, and providing for the payments to be made under the contract for said paving and gutting." Passed, November 2, 1919. The said bonds shall be numbered from one to two, inclusive, shall bear date January 1, 1923, and the maturity of said bonds shall be as follows, to wit: Bond Numbered one shall be payable two years from the date of issue; Bond Numbered two shall be payable three years from the date of issue; Bond Numbered three shall be payable four years from the date of issue; Bond Numbered four shall be payable five years from the date of issue; Bond Numbered five shall be payable six years from the date of issue; Bond Numbered six shall be payable seven years from the date of issue; Bond Numbered seven shall be payable eight years from the date of issue; Bond Numbered eight shall be payable nine years from the date of issue; Bond Numbered nine shall be payable ten years from the date of issue; Bond Numbered ten shall be payable eleven years from the date of issue; Bond Numbered eleven shall be payable twelve years from the date of issue; Bond Numbered twelve shall be payable thirteen years from the date of issue, and that said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of five per centum, payable semi-annually. SECTION 2. That the sum of \$12,000.00 of bonds shall be sold by the Town Treasurer of Hammonton, at public or private sale, at a rate not less than par, upon condition, however, that such sale shall be approved and confirmed by resolution of Town Council. Said bonds, when prepared, sealed and placed on file in the ordinance provided, shall be delivered to the purchaser or purchasers thereof, on receipt of the purchase price therefor, and the receipt of the Town Treasurer shall be to the said purchaser or purchasers, a full acquittance for the said purchase price, and the said purchaser or purchasers shall not be bound to see the application of the same. SECTION 3. The net debt of the municipality computed in the manner provided for in Section 12 of the aforesaid act is \$92,004.20.

SECTION 4. The statement required by Section 12 of the aforesaid act has been made and filed by the Town Treasurer of the Town of Hammonton, with the Town Clerk thereof, under the oath of the said Town Treasurer.

SECTION 5. That all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent herewith, are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistencies, and that this Ordinance shall take effect immediately.
