**Town Council.**

The wisdom in the change of hours of meeting was demonstrated at Wednesday morning's meeting. All members were present excepting Harry Mathew who was absent. Gravel pit was reported by Highway Committee to be in bad condition, owing to burnable trash being dumped in. They recommended having a man burn up what could be burned. Also they advised placing "no dumping" signs.

Treasurer reported the month's receipts as \$113.35. He also gave his report for 1921. His report showed a surplus accounted for, which he had inherited, amounting to nearly two thousand dollars. He asked that the auditor be instructed to start his books with a clean sheet, with proper balances struck.

The subject of cleaning the Water Department for fire plugs will be investigated; also, the paying from the sewerage funds for the water used by the automatic flush tanks about town.

The Collector was instructed to render bill for water used during 1922 to Sewer Department.

The American Legion, through its representative, made several suggestions for Park improvement and upkeep. Among them were the graving of a base-ball diamond; clear cedar trees between grove and Egg Harbor Road; hall needs repainting; lease (for Hall only) is about expiring, and a new one desired. Legion pledged support in whatever is done to improve the Park and grounds. The lease was voted renewed, and suggestions referred to committee.

Engineer Volney was instructed to ascertain needs and cost of installing new large improved pump at disposal plant; also the repair of one pump and addition of another.

As a well must be sunk at water plant, it was the sense of this meeting that the Engineer be instructed to ascertain cost of sinking an eight-inch well (the 12-inch case to go down 100 feet, and from there down six inch). This matter was to be settled at the joint meeting on Thursday evening, when the Water Commission were to be present.

(At Thursday night's meeting, it was decided to sink the well.) Voted that the sludge from disposal plant be sold by Sewer Committee to the best advantage.

The application for pool room license of Sam De Siglar having been refused, the vote was recorded on a technicality, and he was granted the license.

The Mayor took the stand that all holders of licenses must file up to the law or forfeit the privilege.

Messrs O'Donnell and Brownlee considered the place a detriment to the town, when located in barber shops.

Mr. Tell said that he believed all should be treated alike; if any are turned down, all should be treated the same.

Clark reported his receipts as \$46.40. Application was received for extension of sewer on Third Street from Park to Grape. Referred to P. A. Swanson Post, thro' B. A. Davis, employment officer, asked that worthy members of the Legion be remembered when jobs are given out.

Hammonton Cause Club asked that the approach to their house be filled in. Referred to Committee.

Adjourned at high noon, to meet at 8 o'clock Thursday evening, after Committee of the Whole meeting with Water Commission.

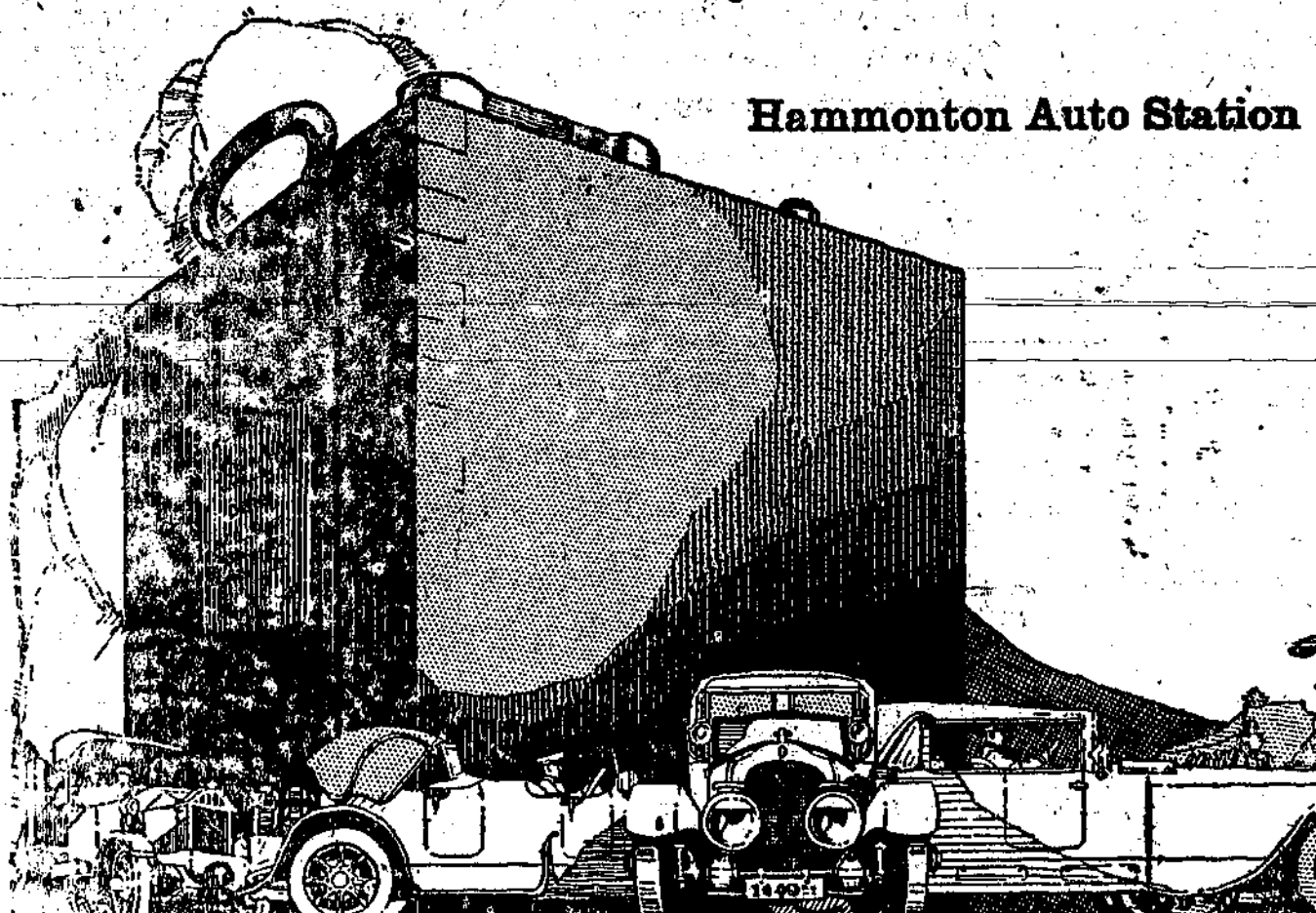

Dr. W. P. Thompson, president of the Atlantic County Board of Agriculture, will also give a brief talk on "Accomplishments of the County Board during the past year."



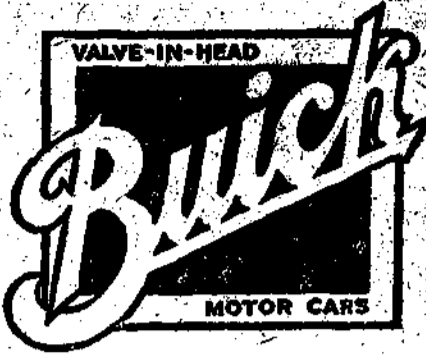
