### Town Council.

Council met in regular session on Wednesday evening, with all chairs full but that of Mr. Tell.

Sewerage Committee submitted ordinance extending sewer south on Washington Street.

Property Committee presented bid of E. V. Coggey for the furnishing of map with house numbers, for sum of \$197.—this to extend up to Main Road. Contract was awarded to Mr. Coggey.

Clerk reported receipts for licenses, etc., as \$37.80.

Bills ordered paid amounted to \$2037.66.

Chief reported three fires, one of which was at Elwood.

Hammonton Laundry Co. requested permission to hang sign over sidewalk. Referred to Committee with power to act.

The County Board of Election wrote regarding re-districting the town, inasmuch as some of the districts now have four hundred or more voters registered.

The Eleventh Street gravel pit was leased to Mr. Bruno for the balance of the season.

Finance Committee was instructed to have Shade Tree Commission ordinance drawn up.

A jitney license ordinance will also be presented at a near future meeting.

Mayor Cunningham complained of general lawlessness and bad conduct, on the part of young loafers, in front of certain places in town. Officers were instructed to break up the habit.

Mr. O'Donnell moved, and it was adopted, that holders of pool room licenses be notified to meet with Town Council, on March 17th, to show cause why their licenses should not be revoked.

The need of new benches at the park was referred to.

The subject of a card roster of town officers and other public information of interest was referred to the Chamber of Commerce.

Adjourned to meet on Wednesday evening next, at eight o'clock.

### The New Hall.

Progress is being made with the subscription list for building the new hall. As it takes a great amount of time to make a thorough canvass of the townspeople, it would facilitate and hasten matters and help very much if people who are willing to subscribe for shares at \$50.00 each would send me a statement of the amount they will subscribe, and it will be recorded.

The hall to be built is to be at least equipped for theatricals, basket ball, bowling alley, shower baths. It is planned to seat 600 people in the theatre, be a two story building, with basket ball court partly basement, and partly above street level. To be built at a cost of \$15,000 to \$20,000, including payment for site.

As a movement like this should now be carried to completion after such a beginning of promise, and practically everyone wants it, why not help me to make it easy and quick, instead of a long delayed process.

I am looking for some more \$50.00 subscriptions. I have some, and those mount up faster and hasten the end I seek. I have no intention of giving up the project, and am working up to the point where I will be warranted in asking for a stockholders' meeting, to form a corporation, and elect officers for such a corporation. Every stockholder up to that date will receive due notice of the meeting.

When the hall is built, I already know where some of its equipment is to be secured. Help put this over, you will not regret it.

The young men of today are the town fathers of ten years hence, and the question, "Father, did you help build this hall?" they will want to say "yes," and be ashamed to say "no," when they know that the father of John's chum subscribed money to help build the hall.

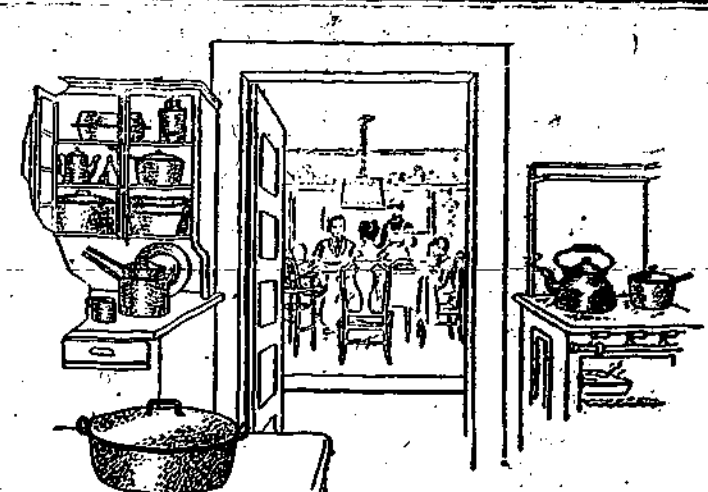
