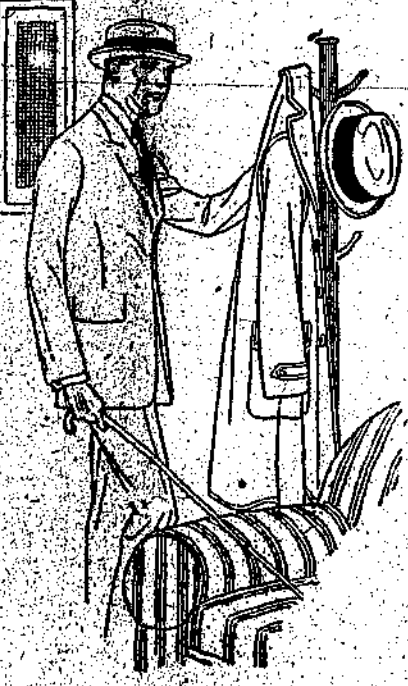

**BOY COOKED ALIVE IN VAT**

Failed into Boiling Water and Died From Burns Five Hours After He Is Rescued.

Millford, Del.—Norman Pettijohn, ten-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John Pettijohn, was cooked alive when, while playing about a vat of boiling water at the plant of the Blinnside Basket Company, he fell in.
