


12-Year-Old Wore Boy's Clothes.

The Blue Tint Only When a Large Quantity of It is Under One's Observation.

Water in its purest state is practically colorless, except that it has a blue tint when a considerable amount of it is viewed together. The water of Loch Katrine in Scotland is nearly pure chemically, although it contains a very small amount of carboniferous matter, which gives it a faint brown tinge. Water, under some circumstances, looks as if it was full of color, and this happens when light thrown upon it is reflected back again, as in the case of a sun bubble and of a rainbow, the latter being formed of drops of rain that reflect back the sunlight, broken up into its different rays which resemble the colors of a rainbow. Stagnant or "hard" water seems to have colors on it because of the different forms of life growing on its surface and forming layers which reflect the light back and forth. The waves of light interfere with each other and cause color. Perfectly pure water has a taste from the salts dissolved in it and from the atmospheric gases, nitrogen, oxygen and carbon dioxide which it contains.
