The New Hall

The subscribing for shares in the new hall is progressing. The list would increase faster if I had more time for a general canvass. As I have to go about the town and solicit every share I get, it is making it a more difficult proposition than it would be if possible stockholders would come forward and tell me, or send me word that they would take a share, or shares, as the case may be.

I have a good amount, and know where I will get much more; I also know where we can borrow four thousand dollars more; have an option on a very suitable site for the hall on Bellevue Ave., and others can be secured; have an architect working on plans which will be ready in another week.

I haven't any intention of giving up the idea, and by some means it is going through if persistence and plans and the financial aid of the people of Hammonton will do it.

Hammonton has no good reason to fail me on this proposition. There is money enough here to build this hall, and do it easily. I am not asking for a gift of the money, but am selling stock in a business corporation which looks much better than some of the stock some of us have invested our money in heretofore.

When I have secured \$10,000, I am going to ask the stock holders to do business; and, meanwhile, be submitting the remainder of the amount. Frankly, though, I do not see why I have to dig it all out share by share, when I have publicly asked all people to subscribe, and when ninety-five per cent of the people of Hammonton want the hall. The fifth number of the Lyceum Course will be given in Victor Hall, on Friday evening, March 25th.

The Montague Light Opera Singers will be the entertainers. The company consists of two ladies, a contralto and a soprano, and two gentlemen, a tenor and a bass. All four members of the company have had a successful career in music. This number is the most expensive number of the whole course, by a small margin, for all have been expensive; but only the best was selected for Hammonton.

Part one of the program consists of quartet, trio, duet and solo selections; part two, an operetta possibly "A Quaker Romance" from an old opera of the eighteenth century; part three, of light opera from some of the most popular grand operas.

Admission is 50 cents as usual. Cards showing the members of the company are on exhibition. It is hoped that many outside of regular patrons will attend this number, as this class of an entertainment is not brought to our town very often.

Much as it is regretted to have to do this, it is necessary to tax our regular patrons an extra 25 cents to pay for the hall. The money will be very acceptable at the door at this number. Of course if any one objects to the tax they will not be embarrassed in any way whatever, as it is true that regular patrons have paid for their tickets.

A sixth number of the course, and a good number, has been secured for April 11th, as it was agreed to give our patrons six numbers.

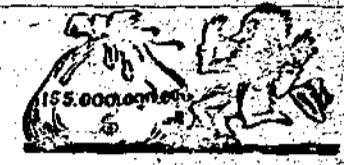
The Boy Scouts have been invited as guests to attend the fifth number.

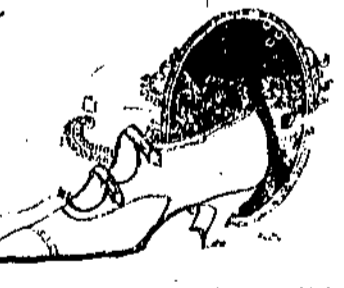

Notice of Extension of Sewer.
To whom it may concern, and particularly to all owners of property abutting on Washington Street from Twelfth Street, to a point in said Washington Street three hundred ninety (390) feet distant from the southeasterly line of said Twelfth Street, in the Town of Hammoncton, in the County of Atlantic, in the State of New Jersey:
Notice is hereby given of the intention of the Town Council of the Town of Hammoncton to extend the sanitary sewer under and along Washington Street in a southeasterly direction from the sewer now existing in Twelfth Street, to a point in said Washington Street three hundred ninety (390) feet distant from the southeasterly line of said Twelfth Street, in said Town of Hammoncton, under the provisions of the following ordinance; to wit:
An Ordinance providing for the extension of the sanitary sewer on Washington Street in a southeasterly direction from Twelfth Street in the Town of Hammoncton, Atlantic County, New Jersey, and providing that such extension shall be undertaken as a local improvement with assessment of benefits.
Section 1. Be it Ordained by the Town of Hammoncton in Council assembled, that the sanitary sewer shall be extended under and along Washington Street, in a southeasterly direction from the sewer now existing on Twelfth Street, to a point distant three hundred ninety feet from the southeasterly line of Twelfth Street, in accordance with the plan therefor approved by Town Council.
Section 2. And be it ordained that the extension of said sewer as aforesaid shall be undertaken as a local improvement.
Section 3. And be it further ordained that the cost of such extension of said sewer shall be paid for in the first instance by the issuance of temporary improvement notes which shall mature in not exceeding one year from their date, and shall bear interest at not exceeding six per centum per annum, and which said notes may from time to time be renewed by the issuance of new notes of such maturity and rate of interest as the Town Council in its wisdom may determine.
Section 4. And be it further ordained that upon the completion of the work of extending the said sewer there shall be assessed upon such land or real estate as may be benefited by said improvement such portion or expense as will equal the amount of benefits actually acquired by such land or real estate in the manner as now provided by law. Said assessment of benefits shall be used for the payment or retirement of the temporary improvement notes which may be issued as hereinbefore provided. If the benefits so assessed shall not equal the cost and expense of the improvement, or shall be insufficient to fully pay or retire the said temporary improvement notes, then the balance shall be paid by the Town at large.
Section 5. And be it further ordained that the ordinance shall take effect immediately.
Notice is hereby further given, that the foregoing ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Town Council of the Town of Hammoncton, held on the 9th day of March, 1921, and that at a meeting to be held in the Council Chamber in the Town Hall on Wednesday the 30th day of March, 1921, at the hour of eight o'clock in the evening, the said Council will consider the final passage of said ordinance.
