**The Kiwanis Club.**

The Club had an unusually busy and enjoyable session Tuesday.

Over a score of suggestions were read, as to what the Kiwanis should do. They were very practical, ranging from a new school house, care for the unprivileged child, and a greater civic pride.

County Agent Eldred, and his associate from Camden County, each addressed the members. They stated that it was almost certain that the State would appropriate \$2500 toward the upkeep of an experiment station in Hammonton, probably on the farm of Kiwanian W. R. Segly.

There was a good attendance, and several visitors.

Laton Parkhurst was greeted, after several weeks' illness.

Probably the greatest "Canadian invasion" which has ever penetrated the United States and certainly the South, will be the delegation of Kiwanians which will visit Atlanta May 28 to 31, inclusive, when The Kiwanis International Convention is held.

Several special trains are being planned for the trip, which will include nearly 500 Kiwanians from the fifty clubs in Canada. The convention was held last year in Toronto, when George Ross, Commercial Traveller, was elected international president, and the Canadians will return the Americans' visit this summer by sending a record delegation on the long trip.

One of the features of the Canadian invasion will be the famous brass band of the Forty-eighth Highlanders' Regiment, which fought over-seas throughout the war. The Highlanders will give concerts in many cities along the route, dressed in their uniforms of Scotch kilts.

Indications are that the Atlanta convention will be the largest ever held by Kiwanis. The International Program Committee met recently in Atlanta, made a tour of the city, and completed a program of business and entertainment which will occupy almost every moment of the time. One of the entertainment features is to be an old-fashioned southern barbecue, cooked by noted ante-bellum negroes, over open pit fires, at which 5,000 persons will be served, while a glimpse of the "Old South" will be seen in "Plantation Days," a musical revue which will depict the customs of other days.

Atlanta, in true southern manner, has issued a special invitation to the wives and daughters of Kiwanians, and a big committee of ladies will look after their entertainment while the men are engaged in business sessions.

The remains of Rocco DeMureo, one of the best known of the older Italian residents, whose death occurred two months ago in Italy, were brought on here this week for burial. The funeral, on Wednesday, was one of the largest in point of number of automobiles ever seen in Hammonton.
