

"He's out," said Molly. "Please sit down and while you're waiting, you can talk to me. I am very loquacious."



## WHY THE NAME "MOONSHINE?"

In Earlier Years the Illicit Liquor Was Supposed to Be Made Only at Night.

America calls the liquor illicitly distilled, especially in the Allegheny mountains, "moonshine." The apparent reason is that it is believed to be distilled at night and secretly transported without payment of a tax or the authority of official permit. The fact is, of course, that the secret stills were set up in the daytime, and the liquor was made at night.

England used the word in similar manner, though not in the same sense. Over there, moonshine is liquor that has been smuggled into the country without payment of a tax. The smuggling is usually done by small boats from the continent, and is called "moonshine" because the boats are usually unloaded by the light of the moon. It was this that gave the liquor its name.

An American moonshine is raw, unaged and often uncolored spirits. British moonshine may be the finest brandy from France, the choicest rum from Jamaica. In the British Isles, especially Ireland, the popular name for home-distilled spirits is "moonshine" because it is in the hills that it is made far from the prying eyes of the excise man.

Holy City in Early Days.

Ancient Jerusalem stood on four hills, now almost entirely leveled for traffic, and the intervening valleys filled with debris. Mount Zion is the highest on the southwest, the city of David made conspicuous today by the towers of the German ecclesiastical buildings for which the former king gave the land. Mount Moriah is on the east, the site of Solomon's temple, separated from Mount Zion by the valley of the Tyropoeon. Mount Akra on the northwest, the two latter representing the crowded quarters of the modern city.

#### Good Record For Any Hen.

No bona fide poultryman ever gets greatly excited over newspaper tales of hens that lay two or even three eggs daily.

Even provided that the tale is not a child of somebody's fancy, the stunt cannot last. It will be the old story of the hare and the tortoise and any wise poultryman banks more on the long distance event than on the sprints.

If a hen lays 19 eggs in March, she is doing well, thinks W. H. Allen, poultry specialist of New Jersey. If she is going to make this record, she must have special care.

He recommends especially that plenty of oyster shells and water be supplied, that 12 to 14 pounds of mash per 100 birds be consumed every day and that birds be not let out until there is green food for them to eat.

What is coming out of the incubator these days is another question of vital importance to every poultryman. Low hatches, the special hen says, are due to poor eggs that lack vitality plus a machine that is not being run properly. To overcome the first difficulty, poor eggs, here are a few "do's" and "don'ts."

Give the breeders exercise and plenty of green feed in the form of sprouted oats, and give them milk. Collect hatching eggs often and held them at a temperature of 50 to 60 degrees.

Do not incubate eggs which are more than 10 days old.

Secondly, incubator laws must be obeyed. Operate the incubator in a cellar, provide good fresh air, but avoid drafts from windows and doors.

Operate according to the manufacturer's directions. Figure five eggs in the incubator now for every pullet to be put in the laying houses next fall.
