Fatal Accident.

Struck by an automobile as he was walking on White Horse Pike near Hammonton, Michael Salvano, fifty-five, a cranberry bog worker, of Westmont, N. J., employed by A. J. Rider, was struck yesterday killing him.

John Ford, of Pleasant Hill, N. J., driver of the machine, was released under bail. According to Coroner Anthony L. Reposito, the killing was accidental, and could not have been avoided by Ford, as Salvano was walking on the wrong side of the road, and stepped suddenly into the path of the machine.

Michael Benedico, who was with Salvano at the time, was unhurt. Four men who were with Ford were also held at the time, but later released on bail.

Permanent Street Paving.

At a well attended public meeting, Tuesday evening, in the High School assembly room, the citizens voted unanimously to approve the recommendation of Town Council's Highway Committee, to pave a portion of the streets leading off Bellevue Avenue, between the Penna. Railroad and Third Street inclusive.

There was quite a discussion, pro and con. The only objection appeared to be that the pavement might interfere with the clearing out of roots in the sewer pipes. Questions arose as to the probable proportion to be paid for by the abutting property owners and the town. Over a score of citizens took part in the discussions.

W. L. Black presented the resolution endorsing Council's recommendation; and when President A. J. Rider put the motion, there was not a dissenting voice.

The estimated cost of construction, including gutters, is \$32,123.

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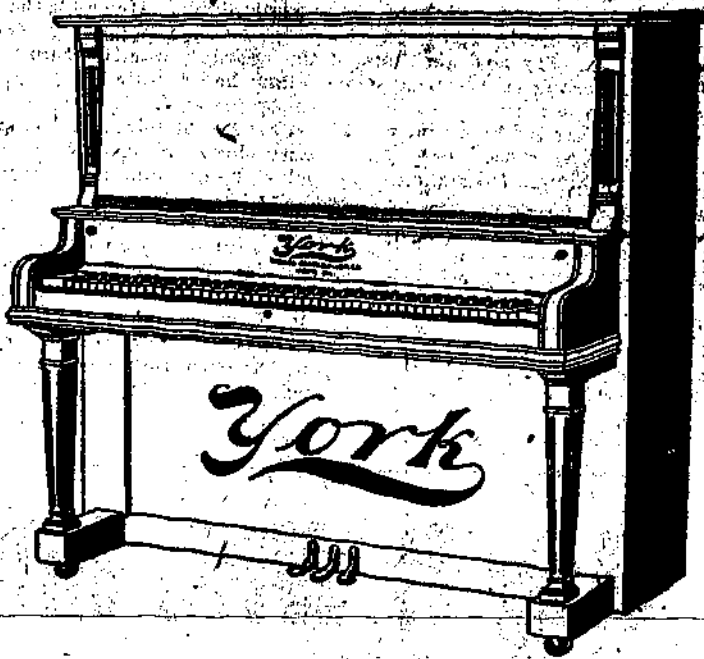
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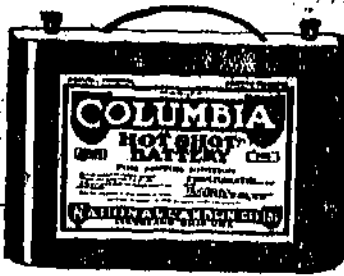
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Old Days in Dixie.
