Great Day for Pupils.

It was a beautiful morning when our pupils gathered in School Park to journey to Mays Landing for the Annual Spelling and Arithmetic Contest, last Saturday.

The one episode marring the trip over was a soft tire on Driver Young's Reo. The young folks had a jolly time playing, while Drivers Young and Twomey fixed the tire. The day was replete with activities. There was the Spelling Contest and the Arithmetic or Rapid Calculation Contest.

Hammonton took prizes as follows:—In Spelling, First Prize, Rita Eastman. Other prizes, Dorothy Elliott, Ferdinand Woodson, Lenore Lucas. In Arithmetic, Donald Watson, Jennie Arons, Henry Millh.

Announcements of results in County Wide Essay Contest was also made. Miss Edith Gruse, of the Hammonton High School, took a \$5.00 prize in that. Announcement was also made that the Prize Essay on "Evergreens" went to Rita Eastman. Every school taking part in the Essay on Evergreens Contest, was presented Saturday, with an evergreen tree. The one for Hammonton now stands in ball park, being planted by a committee of children from grades 8 and 7.

A banner is awarded to the School that makes the highest team average. A team is composed of one child for each hundred children enrolled in a district including Kindergarten and High School. This makes the number in a team from Hammonton, 17 and from each of the other districts, considerably fewer, e. g., if a district has a team of 4, 5, 8, or a smaller number, the probability of getting the banner is much greater.

Which means that a team of nine pupils would have a better chance of getting the banner than a team of seventeen. This public statement is made not to lessen the honor due the districts that get the banner but to call attention to the handicap which rests upon the schools with large teams.

Those who will represent Hammonton at the Penn relays on Saturday, April 29th, will be Lambeth Monfort, Richard Monfort, Anthony Secco and George Youngman. They will run in the order named. H. Town Council.

Council met on Wednesday morning, with all present but Messrs. White and Motiolo.

Clerk read minutes of the regular and two adjourned meetings. Jas. W. Cottrell, for the American Legion, explained the removal of the trees at the Park. Voted that the Shade Tree Commission be notified that Council is favorable to the project of removal of trees on the site of the proposed ball-ground, as outlined by the Legion.

Clerk reported his receipts as \$130.40. Overseer of Poor reported on the receipts and expenses of the department, and the disposal of eleven domestic relation cases and seven juvenile cases.

Fire Chief reported that there were no fires during March in town. One company responded to an alarm at Pleasant Mills on March 18th. He asked for 400 feet of chemical hose. Referred to Committee, with power to act.

Rice Hardware Co. applied for permission to install large gasoline tank near curb. Referred. Letter was received, recommending extension of building line to Reading, as that square was rapidly becoming a building center.

Board of Health recommended the fixing of the first week in May as clean-up-week. Suggestion was adopted.

Clerk read report of Town meeting, called to discuss paving of streets. Adjourned to meet on next Wednesday morning.
