Parent-Teachers' Association.

Many are asking just what a Parent-Teachers' Association is, and what it does.

This is a club of teachers and parents, organized to bring into closer relation the home and the school, to raise the standard of home life and to interest parents in co-operating with the schools in the work for better conditions in the community, such as better buildings, better lunch facilities, better movies, etc.

Meetings are held once a month. When subjects along this line are presented to members for discussion, and plans are formed for improving conditions, speakers from out of town will give talks on subjects connected with the welfare of our children. The Civic Club has given up the May meeting to the work of organizing the Association; but after that it will be an entirely separate organization, electing its own officers, and not in any way connected with the Civic Club.

Everyone interested in the children of the town is asked to come to the meeting, Tuesday, May 3rd, at 3:30. Mrs. Samuel P. Leeds, who will help in the work of organization, will bring with her Dr. Clara K. Bartlett, a Medical Inspector in the Atlantic City Schools, who will give a talk on sanitation, hygiene, and food for our school children.

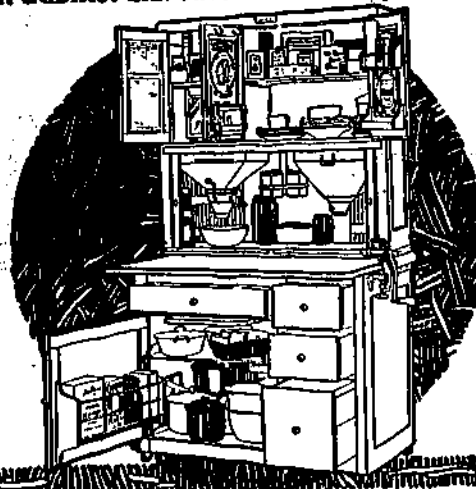
The weather the past fortnight has not been favorable, either to vegetation or human life. Colds are prevalent, and early crops are at a standstill.

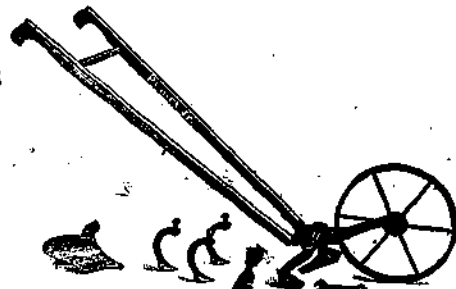

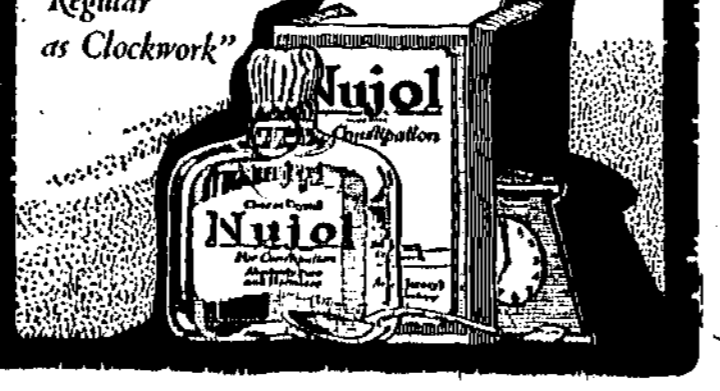
