MAY DAY FESTIVAL.

The May Day Festival will be held next Saturday, May 13th, in the morning in School Park, and in the afternoon in the Park at the Lake.

The morning exercises will consist of a march of children from the school house to the grounds, in which the Boy Scouts, the Girl Pioneers, and Camp Fire Girls will take part,—meet at Ball Park at 9; the forming of a flag by two hundred and fifty pupils; singing of patriotic songs; crowning of May Queen; Indian Sun Dance by the Camp Fire Girls; Kindergarten Folk Songs; Gymnastic Drill by Main Road School pupils; Rose Dance; Garland Drill; Dance of the May Pole; Competitive Singing by all the Schools of Atlantic County represented here that day.

Many of them have replied, and are expecting to be here in force. Silver cups have been contributed for prizes.

The new Italian Band will furnish music both morning and afternoon, and everyone is cordially invited to attend the ceremonies.

This promises to be one of the finest events ever held in Hammonton, and all our townspeople are urged to support the committees by being present as much of the day as possible.

No admission fee will be charged for anything. Many business men and others have contributed to the expenses, and others may do so through any of the committee.

The races and contests in the Park, in the afternoon, promise to be interesting, there being already 180 entries in the different events. Mr. Goddard has charge of this work, and promises good sport. Judges will be here from University of Pennsylvania, and the Committee has succeeded in securing the services of an expert life-saver, to be on hand in case of any danger. Every precaution has been taken to care for children, and parents may feel safe in sending them all day.

Lunch will be provided at small cost, at different places. Committees will meet the trains, to escort visitors to their destinations. A checking system has been provided for, so that out-of-town people may check coats, baggage, etc.

No pains have been spared to make this one great day for Hammonton, and everyone should lend a hand in some way. About five hundred children will participate in the morning. Be sure to be at School Park at half-past nine, for it has been decided to begin on time, that the crowd may have ample time to secure lunch and reach the Park at one o'clock.

The new Band will appear in uniform, and are already working on music for the day.

Everyone come out, and make it a Gala Day for all. COM.

ATHLETICS.

The events at the Park begin at one o'clock sharp. The order is not fully arranged, but will include the following:

One hundred yards dash, base ball throw, running high and broad jump, chinning bar, half mile run (open to pupils of both High and Grammar Schools). In addition, High School pupils will have a one mile relay race and twelve-pound shot put; and for Grammar Grade, a half-mile relay and three legged race.

Prizes will be, cups for each, High School and Grammar (boys), on the most points; cup for base ball championship; also one for Grammar School.

There are 180 entries in,—boys and girls competing from schools at Pleasantville, Richland, Egg Harbor, Minto, Ventnor, North field and Hammonton. There will be 250 individual ribbon prizes. The judges are from the Officers Club, of Philadelphia, assisted by Atlantic County school officials.

This will be one of the greatest attractions Hammonton has had for several years; and to Professor Goddard is due much credit for his untiring efforts. Three thousand children will probably take part in the day's events. Refreshments will be on sale at the stand.

An Ordinance.

An Ordinance for the appropriation of moneys for the Payment of Interest on \$117,000 Funding Bonds of the Town of Hammonton, and respecting taxes to be assessed and raised for the year 1916 to cover said appropriation.

Section 1. Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Hammonton, Atlantic County, New Jersey, that there shall be appropriated, and they do hereby appropriate for the year 1916, for the purpose of paying interest on \$117,000 Funding Bonds of the Town of Hammonton dated November 1, 1915, the sum of Five Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$5,850.00.)

Section 2. And Be it Further Ordained, that of the sum so appropriated there shall be assessed and raised by taxation the sum of \$3,788.20, which said sum is determined as follows:

The Board of Trade.

A good number were present at Tuesday evening's meeting.

Among the communications was an invitation from Rev. Marple, to attend Mothers Day service on May 14th. While as an organization they could not accept, the writer was assured that all would attend who could do so.

A united effort was made to secure female factory help in towns as far up as Waterford; and jitney routes are quite probable, making trips each way.

With great regret the resignation of Sec'y Doughty was accepted, he finding the duties of that position too great. The nomination of a successor was left to Messrs. Rider, Packard and Fry.

Three new members were voted on favorably, as were about six at a special meeting two weeks ago. Six proposed names were referred to Membership Committee.

Prof. Armstrong asked moral support for the Field Day to be held here on Sept. 9. Labor Day, in charge of the permanent committee on Farmers' Week. There will be speakers, valuable advice from noted agriculturists, exhibits of Atlantic County produce, fruits, berries, canned goods, etc. Visitors will be present from neighboring counties. The event will take place at the Park.

Moral encouragement was also asked for the Boy Scouts, who have just begun farming the plot corner of Bellevue and Tilton St., under the direction of Prof. Armstrong. Each Scout will have a plot of his own, and will pay his own expenses.

The Albus Company, manufacturers of women's suits and coats, employing mostly men, has signed necessary papers, and the contract given to complete Romeo's building. They hope to take possession of the factory June 1st, bringing a number of families, and will want many men.

The Figueroa Cut Glass Company have contracted for a two-story factory, 140 x 32 feet, at Pleasant St. and West End Avenue, to be ready about Sept. 1st.

Ground was broken this week for the Baulig clothing factory, at Washington and Orchard Streets, to be ready in about four months.
